Summer Office & Recycle Center Hours

The Lake Office will be open on Saturdays beginning March 1st. The office will be open Mon – Fri 9am-4pm & Sat 9am-3pm.

I am normally in the office during the week until 5pm. If a member needs something at the office after hours, you only need to call or email to make an appointment.

The Trash & Recycle Center hours will switch to Summer hours beginning May 19th.

Deadline for 2014 Dues and Assessments is April 1st

Statements for the 2014 Dues and Assessments were mailed out on February 10th. The amount for 2014 will be \$595.00 (\$25 Dues & \$570 Assessment) & \$59.50 for each additional lot. This is a \$20 increase in assessments, the first increase in several years. Payment must be received in the office before April 2nd to avoid a 10% penalty. A monthly finance charge of 1 ½ % is charged on all outstanding balances. Boat permits & golf carts are the same as last year. Boats with a motor are \$50 and all others are \$15. Golf carts are \$20 but night operation golf carts will require inspection before the new permits are issued. If you mail in your payments, permits and passes will be returned by mail except for the night operation golf cart permits.

WHAT DOES THE MAINTENANCE TEAM DO IN THE WINTER?

When winter arrives, our men trade lawn mowers for snow plows, and I do NOT suggest you ask them this winter if they want to build a snowman! They have had to spend way TOO much time plowing the roads! With each new snowfall they get 2 snowplows out on our roads, one on Santee Drive and the other on the back roads, clearing snow and spreading salt and sand. Each man plows for 6 hours to clear them well enough for us to get where we are going and back home safely. In addition, a few things they have been doing are:

Repaired and serviced mowing equipment in preparation for next summer

Built 6 new picnic tables to replace damaged ones

Built a key storage cabinet

Reupholstered 3 chairs from the community room

Installed a new shaft & gears for the conveyor on the dump truck to apply salt & sand on the roads

Repairs and maintenance to our buildings, restaurant and restrooms



Respond to sewer calls

Their next job is to build a storage area for the flags & poles for the Avenue of Flags for when they are not in use. If spring does not arrive soon, the LSPOA Board and Brad will have additional jobs for these four men to do. So, when you see our maintenance men out in the community, give them a wave to thank them for everything they do ALL year long.

SAFTEY ALERT and GOOD ADVICE

The following are some NFPA safety tips for running portable generators. Please use them with caution and follow all manufacturing guidelines. They are a great tool, but used improperly they can be damaging and even deadly. Before installing or using a generator get an electrician to advise you on the best and safest way to attach them to your electrical service.

Generator safety tips

Downed utility lines, power company blackouts, heavy snow falls or summer storms can all lead to power outages. Many people turn to a portable generator for a temporary solution without knowing the risks.

- Generators should be operated in well ventilated locations outdoors away from all doors, windows and vent openings.
- Never use a generator in an attached garage, even with the door open.
- Place generators so that exhaust fumes can't enter the home through windows, doors or other openings in the building.
- Make sure to install carbon monoxide (CO) alarms in your home. Follow manufacturer's instructions for correct placement and mounting height.
- Turn off generators and let them cool down before refueling. Never refuel a generator while it is running.
- Store fuel for the generator in a container that is intended for the purpose and is correctly labeled as such. Store the containers outside of living areas.

Carbon monoxide incidents are more common in residential properties.

Carbon monoxide (CO) is an invisible, odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely. In the home, heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel can be sources of carbon monoxide.

- If you need to warm a vehicle, remove it from the garage immediately after starting it. Do not run a vehicle or other fueled engine or motor indoors, even if garage doors are open. Make sure the exhaust pipe of a running vehicle is not covered with snow.
- During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow build-up.
- A generator should be used in a well-ventilated location outdoors away from windows, doors and vent openings.
- Gas or charcoal grills can produce CO only use outside.
- You should also install CO alarms in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home and in other locations where required by applicable laws, codes or standards.

6 Tips to Prepare for Blackout

Before you read the tips, we'd like to ask: How do you prepare for blackout

- 1. Follow energy conservation measures to keep the use of electricity as low as possible, which can help power companies avoid imposing rolling blackouts.
- 2. Fill plastic containers with water and place them in the refrigerator and freezer if there's room. Leave about an inch of space inside each one, because water expands as it freezes. Chilled or frozen water will help keep food cold during a temporary power outage, by displacing air that can warm up quickly with water or ice that keeps cold for several hours without additional refrigeration.
- 3. Be aware that most medication that requires refrigeration can be kept in a closed refrigerator for several hours without a problem. If unsure, check with your physician or pharmacist.
- 4. Keep your car tank at least half full because gas stations rely on electricity to power their pumps.
- 5. Know where the manual release lever of your electric garage door opener is located and how to operate it. Garage doors can be heavy, so know that you may need help to lift it.
- 6. Keep a key to your house with you if you regularly use the garage as the primary means of entering your home, in case the garage door will not open.



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Warm Caramel Apple Pudding Cake

- 1 large granny smith apple, peeled and thinly sliced
- 1 pkg. yellow cake mix, divided
- 2 pkg. (3.4 oz each) vanilla instant pudding
- 1 1/2 cups cold milk
- 1 jar (12.25 oz) caramel ice cream topping
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 cup thawed whipped topping 1/2 cup dry roasted peanuts

- Directions:
- 1. Heat oven to 350°F. Toss apples with 1 Tbsp. cake mix. Prepare cake batter with remaining cake mix as directed on package; pour into 13x9-inch baking dish sprayed with cooking spray. Top with apples.
- 2. Beat dry pudding mixes, milk, 3/4 cup caramel topping and water with whisk 2 min.; drizzle over apples. Place baking dish on baking sheet.
- 3. Bake cake 1 hour to 1 hour 10 min. or until golden brown. Cool 20 min. (Sauce will thicken slightly as it cools.)
- 4. Whisk remaining caramel topping and whipped topping until well blended. Spoon over cake slices just before serving; top with nuts.





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




ATTENTION ALL BASS TOURNAMENT FISHERMEN

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
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

Winter Birding Delight at Lake Santee

It has been a particularly good winter for birders at Lake Santee as the heavy snows have brought out flocks of birds seeking food, water and shelter. Alice Ball was delighted by a flock of American Robins in her backyard in January when one doesn't expect to see what is considered a spring/summer bird by many of us. For this birder woodpeckers hold great winter interest because 1) they are large, therefore easy to spot, 2) they are dramatically marked so easy to distinguish, and 3) they visit feeders so they are easy to spot from the comfort of one's house.

Lake Santee is abundant with woodpeckers because of our rich habitat of woods and trees. They do not nest in boxes and platforms, just tree cavities making it very important to provide them with living and dead trees for their nests. They also depend on trees for insects, fruit, acorns and nuts for their food as well as feeders.

Of the 180 + species of woodpeckers known worldwide, we are blessed to have 7 species readily spottable here. One in particular, the Yellow-Bellied Sapsucker is just that; a sapsucker. Even if it is elusive to spot, the distinctive, lacy feeding pattern on the branches of its food source is evidence of its presence. The Pileated Woodpecker is attracted to sassafras trees. A trip through The Nature Habitat will reveal the rectangular and oval shaped holes on the trunks, low enough for hikers to spot. It is our largest specie at 16-19.5" in size. Two very similar species are the little Downy (6.5 ") and larger HAIRY (9.5".) It is not actually hairy; it is feathered just like all woodpeckers. The Red-headed Woodpecker is the only specie with a completely red head. It doesn't visit feeders as readily as others but they are easily spotted in the wooded area along Iroquois Trail. The red belly of the Red-Bellied Woodpecker is so obscure that it seems mislabeled. Its zebra-backed pattern is much more distinctive. It does have read on its head. The Common Flicker is distinctive close up by its black bib and by its white rump in flight. Flickers can also be ground feeders in the summer, liking the insects it finds. (Thanks to Deb Evans and Betty Gabbard for the fantastic photographs.)

Woodpeckers at Lake Santee are dependent on us to preserve and increase their habitat. Wooded areas with scrubby undergrowth are essential to their survival. Live and dead trees provide food, shelter and nesting sites. If you don't have trees and shrubs on your property, plant some and the birds will come! Besides, they are good for all wildlife and a healthy environment for us

I don't know about the rest of you but I have fed 5 forty-pound bags of Oil Sunflower seed since Christmas and I'm on a fifty pound bag now. I have so much fun watching the birds and keeping track of what I see each day. I have a spread sheet and there are days when I see as many as 18 to 20 different kinds of birds in one day. I had about 6 Robins come to my feeder and little evergreen on Saturday (2-8-2014). I wish I would have had something special to feed them. I have seen two female Towhees at one time. I will be glad to hear them this summer when they are nesting and raising their young. My Carolina Wren has been visiting me a lot lately; he even came out to the wood shed while I was firing up the furnace. Happy Birding.

Spring Alert-Be on the Lookout

We probably haven't felt the last winter blast but signs are pointing to milder weather. Good signs of spring are the return of our turkey vultures and osprey. This will be the fourth spring of hoping for a nesting pair on one of our platforms. We get migrating ducks, too. They'll be moving through soon. The first blooming wildflower, skunk cabbage, will be visible at The Nature Habitat. Just follow the trail down the hill, around to the left to the alluvial bottom (swamp, on other words) and look in the muck to your left. There are three plants about 6" tall with a curled, maroon blossom in the center. While there, look and listen for woodpeckers. They'll be calling and hammering to attract mates



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
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Totem Pole Trivia

Lake Santee Women's Club had a vision 16 years ago that they would like to have a new Totem Pole at the entrance to the lake. With the LSPOA board's permission they began to study Totem Poles. Some of our members had seen the beautiful carvings done by Red Hawkins, and a group of us met with Red in town to discuss our project. Red agreed to carve our Totem Pole, and he gave us the challenge to find a Catalpa Tree with at least 30 feet of

straight trunk. The entire community joined in the search for such a tree, but every one we found branched too near the ground. Red came to our rescue because he had located a suitable Catalpa Tree on the farm of his friend, Dave York.

On July 20, 1998, Pat & Keith Burgess and Nancy & Clair Fredrickson were to meet Red in town to drive to the tree farm. Darrow McCreary, Lake Manager, called Nancy early that morning to tell her to hurry because our current Totem Pole had been hit by lightning the night before. Arriving at the farm, our chosen tree was about 80 years old and growing in a grove of trees that had been planted for fence posts. It was 70 feet tall, no branches for at least 30 feet, and straight as an arrow (or Totem Pole). It was beautiful! Paul Hughes of Hughes Tree Service, cut down the tree and cut off the branches, donating his services which we really appreciated. We had the tree moved to Red's Buggy Bath on Main Street.

The "Barking Party"

On August 3, many Women's Club members and their husbands joined us for what became known as the famous "Barking Party" to remove the bark from our Catalpa tree. The tree then had to age for 6 months.

During this time, the Women's Club members had to decide what we wanted carved on our Totem Pole. We studied books, talked to Red Hawkins, our carver, and thought of symbols that represented our love for Lake

Santee. Barb Hickey, the artist in

our group, helped us draw them in a pleasing order on a long strip of brown paper, which I still treasure. Red was a big help on the details of our drawing, and we gave him artistic license to make changes as he saw fit. In October we had agreed on final plans, and we moved our tree to Red's home at Lake McCoy. Red built a shelter in his yard and covered it with plastic so he could have a heater inside to keep him warm as he carved.

Red began carving in February, and we were excited to see the beginnings of his carving on March 2nd. Each time we went to see it we were thrilled to see how he had taken our sketches and transformed them into a work of art. Red finished carving about

May 1^{st} , and on May 10^{th} we moved our Totem Pole a 3^{rd} time – to our new Lake Santee maintenance building.

Barb and Dick Hickey were in charge of staining the Totem Pole, and they purchased penetrating finish that Jean & Company tinted in the colors we had selected. The week of May 10-15 we donned our best clothes, and tried to stay out of Tom Crowe's way as we stained and sealed our Totem Pole. With Red's detailed carving, and Barb and Dick's colored plan and their artistic guidance, it was almost like paint by number. Our stainers were Barb & Dick Hickey, Connie Barnes, Pat Burgess, Rilla Denton and Nancy Fredrickson.

At this point we turned the project over to Tom Crowe, Darrow McCreary, Harold Cooke, and the maintenance crew. A few things they had to figure out were: how to reinforce the pole to keep it from splitting, how deep the concrete needed to be, how to mount it so that there would be an air space between the wood and the concrete so the pole would not wick

moisture from the concrete, how to lift the pole into place, and how to level it once it was in position. The week of June 7th, they dug the hole and poured the concrete. Tom's final challenge came on June 22 when he brought in a boom truck and he and his crew skillfully and successfully put our Totem Pole in place.

Our new totem pole was 22 feet tall and weighed 3,000 pounds. The Greensburg Daily News was here, and we were on the



We all hoped the 3rd time would be the charm, since this was our third totem pole.




Totem Pole #1 1964-1988



A motion was made by Clair Fredrickson and seconded by Greg Montgomery to write off the amounts for the Lots listed above.


