#### IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR DRINKING WATER

#### LEVELS OF HALOACETIC ACIDS ABOVE DRINKING WATER STANDARDS FOR LAKE SANTEE RWWD

Our water system recently violated a drinking water standard. Although this is not an emergency, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened, what you should do, and what we are doing to correct this situation.

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a regular basis. The results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not our drinking water meets EPA's health standards. The results that we received for Haloacetic Acids for the last monitoring period show that our system currently exceeds the standard(s), or Maximum Contaminant Level(s) (MCL). The MCL for Haloacetic Acids is 60 ug/L. As of 12/31/2015, a locational running annual average is 61.2, 67.6 ug/L.

#### What should I do?

You do not need to use an alternative (e.g., bottled) water supply. However, if you have specific health concerns, consult your doctor.

#### What does this mean?

Some people who drink trihalomethanes (THM) in excess of the MCL over many years may experience problems with their liver, kidneys, or central nervous system, and may have an increased risk of getting cancer. Some people who drink water containing haloacetic acids (HAA) in excess of the MCL over many years may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

#### What Happened? What is being done?

When the sample was taken in November, we were bypassing our granular activated carbon tanks due to an issue with the carbon. We have since replaced the carbon in December of 2015. We have also drained the water tower and had a contractor come in and clean the inside of the tank. We also finished flushing water mains on April 12, 2016. The combination of these three things should help lower our THM and HAA results. All testing results since December 2015 have been below the MCL's set by the EPA.

A quick update on a few things.

#### Public Notice

Some of you may have some questions about the public notice on the opposite page. EPA requires the RWWD to sample four times per year for trihalomethanes (THM) and haloacetic acids (HAA), which are disinfection by products. We collect samples from two different locations in February, May, August and November. The average of the samples collected in these four different months has to be below 80 ug/L for trihalomethanes and 60 ug/L for haloacetic acids. We have maintained an average below 80 ug/L for trihalomethanes. Our average did exceed 60 ug/L for haloacetic acids. As we stated in our previous newsletters we were having problems with our granular activated carbon from May through November in 2015. The carbon was leaching manganese that was causing an increase in our finished water turbidity. In consultation with IDEM the decision was made to bypass the carbon until a solution was found.

One of the main functions of the carbon is the removal of organic matter from the water. When organic matter comes into contact with chlorine haloacetic acids are formed. The more organic matter the higher the haloacetic acids results will be. The fact that we were bypassing the carbon in May and November resulted in us having higher than normal haloacetic acid results. The testing results from May and November resulted in our average exceeding the maximum contaminant level of 60 ug/L for haloacetic acids.

It was determined that our carbon needed to be replaced and that was completed in December 2015. The RWWD also hired a contractor to clean and inspect the water tower. This work was completed on March 22. RWWD employees also finished flushing water mains on April 12. The combination of these three things should aid in a significant reduction of haloacetic acids in your drinking water. All testing results have been below the maximum contaminant level since the carbon replacement.

#### **Water Tower Inspection**

The water tower was drained, cleaned and inspected on March 22. The inspection was performed by Dixon Engineering. Preliminary information from Dixon was that the paint appeared to be in good condition. A full written report will be provided by Dixon Engineering.



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
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

#### WANTED BULLHEAD CATFISH




Lake Santee is experiencing an unwanted increase in its number of bullhead catfish. Unlike Channel Catfish, Bullheads are an undesirable fish whose size remains small, and can quickly overpopulate. Bullheads are bottom feeders that stir up bottom sediments, which can increase turbidity, and add to our water clarity issues. Channel Catfish can be easily distinguished from Bullheads by their deeply forked tail. Anglers, please remove all Bullhead Catfish that you catch. Thank you, Lake and Beaches Committee.

#### Zebra Mussel (Dreissena polymorpha)



Zebra mussels (*Dreissena polymorpha*) are prolific invaders that cost the U.S. billions of dollar each year. These small mussels from Eurasia can clog water intakes and damage equipment by attaching to boat motors and hard surfaces. They can damage ecosystems by harming fisheries, smothering native mussels and crayfish, and littering beaches with their sharp shells.

In the late 1980s, zebra mussels spread from Europe to the Great Lakes in contaminated ballast water discharged from foreign ships. From there, they expanded to the Mississippi River, its tributaries, and to inland lakes. Zebra mussels spread primarily by attaching to boat hulls, aquatic plants, nets, fishing equipment, or in water. Adult zebra mussels can survive out of water for days under certain conditions. Your actions are vital to prevent their spread.

#### **General Characteristics**

- Zebra mussels look like small clams with a yellowish or brownish "D"-shaped shell, usually with dark and light-colored stripes (hence the name "zebra")
- They can be up to two inches long, but most are under one inch. Zebra mussels usually grow in clusters containing numerous individuals and are generally found in shallow (6-30 feet), algae-rich water
- Zebra mussels are the only freshwater mollusc that can firmly attach itself to solid objects submerged rocks, dock pilings, boat hulls, water intake pipes, etc.
- On smooth surfaces, young zebra mussels feel like fine sandpaper.
- Juveniles are about the size of peppercorns.



#### What You Can Do

- Learn to recognize zebra mussels.
- **Inspect** and **remove** aquatic plants, animals, and mud from boat, motor, and trailer.
- **Drain** water from boat, motor, livewell, bilge, and bait containers.
- **Dispose** of unwanted live bait and worms in the trash.
- **Rinse** boat and equipment with high-pressure and/or hot water (104° F), especially if moored for over a day, **OR**
- **Dry** everything for at least 5 days.
- Never introduce fish, plants, crayfish, snails or clams from one body of water to another.
- **Report** new sightings note exact location; place specimens in a sealed plastic bag or store in rubbing (isopropyl) alcohol.

#### Know the rules!

Unauthorized introduction of zebra mussels, fish, or plants into the wild is illegal. Protect your property and our waters.

According to INPAWS (Indiana Native Plant and Wildflower Society), ephemerals (meaning transitory, quickly fading) are woodland plants that show above ground in the early spring, before the trees have leafed out. Do we have them at Lake Santee? Indeed we do, not only gracing the forest floor of The Nature Habitat but in any wooded area in the ravines and roadsides that is allowed to remain undisturbed and natural. These tender but tenacious plants take advantage of the sunlight to develop leaves, stems and flowers (aerial parts) and produce seed before going dormant and disappearing until the next spring. (Wikipedia)

At Friends of Wildlife Spring Wildflower Walks (the weather dictating several outings) on April 3 and 10 (and another personal foray on the 17<sup>th</sup>) there were blooming ephemerals everywhere including tiny white Bishop's cap, yellow Bristly Buttercup, white Cut-leaved Toothwort, yellow Adder's Tongue (aka Trout Lily, Dogtooth Violet), white Dutchman's Breeches, pinky-lavender Hepatica, white Rue Anemone, pink Spring Beauty, white Star Chickweed, white- blue Sweet William, maroon Prairie Trillium, blue, yellow and white Woodland violets, pink Wild Geranium and Wild Ginger with hidden maroon blossoms covered the forest floor and hillsides. Foliage promises May blooms for May Apple, Virginia Waterleaf, Jack-in-the-Pulpit, and Wild Leek, among others that are difficult to identify without a flower. A new plant for us is Bedstraw, yet to bloom, so we'll be looking for it too. A visit to the spring woods has other delights in the ferns, mosses and bird songs that echo among the trees. Nature at its best at Lake Santee!

# **Rules & Regulations – Polly Ann Fox**

Upon hearing no additions or changes Dick called for a motion to approve. The change carried on a motion by Carol and seconded by Jim. ## Recreation - Carol Goodwin

She asked for volunteers to complete the painting and then stated that her paint crew at the car dealership would then spray them with a clear coat to ensure longevity. David said that they can live on a boat or trailer out of water for about five days. He advised members to thoroughly check if moving the boat from one body of water to another. Go to the lake website to watch a video explaining how to clean the boat and ensure zebra mussels do not inhabit our Lake.

David reported that the Lake was recently stocked with 4,000 large mouth bass as well as 1,400 hybrid stripers. These fish were released April 13 and David has a video of the release if anyone would like to see it.

Nancy Fredrickson asked if anyone knew anything about the youth fishing tournament. Dick stated that while the youth tournament used to fall under Recreation, Lake and Beaches is now in charge. # Roads & Maintenance - Ron Day

New trash containers are in and have been placed at both beaches and the shelter houses. The dam culvert liner was installed and will be grouted soon as weather permits. Secondary roads are being prepped for adding stone where needed.

The north entrance will be closed tomorrow for road work and the security building has been purchased, delivered and set. Our goal is to soon place millings from Santee Drive to CR880 on Tass Trail for a base and install speed bumps to slow down traffic. A bulletin board has been purchased and will be installed. Electricity will be run to the

security building and to the bulletin board. Some landscape stone will be placed to make a nice entrance. Gate guards will also work there on the weekends during the summer. A security camera is in place to cover the building as well as the road in and out. The chip and seal on Itawamba from Santee Drive to Sanchez Trail and Santee Drive / Pueblo Trail from Ontario Trail to near Mohican Trail has not held up and will be getting millings applied. We will also be looking at adding millings on some other secondary roads as budget allows. The Board feels the rejuvenation and crack seal has been a success on the black top and are considering doing another mile this year. The rejuvenation as opposed to a new layer of asphalt will free up funds to address the secondary roads.

The new zero turn mower is in and has been used.

Dick also mentioned that we have had questions about the removal of the older soft maple trees at the entrance and information is on the website and Facebook, but trees were planted with the intent of removing the older trees as the younger trees grew. Several of the older trees have died or are dying are removal is necessary. The wood will be used for bonfires and heating at the maintenance building.

The stone pads for the fire rings for bonfires will be installed next week.

# Security - Mike Cutrufelli

Mike stated that as always he commends the security team for doing a fine job. Mike passed around some flyers that will be posted concerning school bus safety and safety in general. Dick elaborated on the flyers stating that drivers are not stopping while students are getting on and off the bus. People are hurriedly trying to beat the bus, creating a real safety concern for our children. Mike encouraged people to call incidents in to our security and to slow down. Mike also warned that security would be using the radar gun and giving speeding tickets when necessary. Please watch your speed. Mike asked that people not litter and if anyone sees litter they pick it up and dispose of it properly to help maintain a healthy and beautiful community.

It was mentioned that there was an elderly person who was in need of help, and emergency workers had no way of getting into the house. There is a thing called a Knox Box that allows the Fire Department and local emergency teams a key or access to your homes. Schools and businesses already use these as an added measure of safety. A member asked if the lake planned on having summer security at the North entrance this year as well as the main entrance and beach area. Mike answered that we are going to have a guard on duty at both gates, as well as cameras already installed at both entrances.

# Road rejuvenation and crack seal

There was some discussion about the benefits of the rejuvenation process and whether a year was ample time to judge the effectiveness. Ron stated that other counties he spoke to say it extends the life of the roads up to five years. The process helps also with easy snow removal/melting evident this year. The purpose of going this route is to extend and stretch the paving budget so that we can work on some of the other side roads without letting the main road suffer.

The crack seal and rejuvenation process would go from around Jay Powers home for about one mile. The price is estimated at around \$17, 470.00.

# Millings Quotes

The lake received quotes to use millings on various other small project roads. The quote to complete Taas Trail at the entrance is \$8800. Then to bring Itawamba, Pueblo/Santee Drive up to standards and fix all sink areas and pot holes, then layering with millings is an additional amount. The chip and seal is failing. To complete and fix Itawamba to Sanchez is estimated to cost \$17,746.50 while doing the same on Pueblo/Santee to Niagra would cost \$14,300. Ron explained that the crew is going to mix the millings with some oil to help solidify and pack the road. Ron stated that the Board is considering completing projects on some smaller areas at Beverly Cove (\$4,906.00), Mohawk (\$10,033.50), and Pawnee (\$11,742.00). No motion or approval needed since these were budget items.

# 2017-2018 Mowing Contract

Brad stated that the mowing contract with Bernard Meyer is up after this year and needs approved. The amount will be unchanged for the upcoming 2017 year, and will only increase by 50 cents in 2018. The bid is for the amounts of \$21 and \$18.75 for their respective areas. The bid was accepted and approved on a motion by Carol and seconded by Mike.

# Lignin prices for 2016

A quote for lignin, the road dust suppressant, from Prince Minerals was received. The cost is \$85 per ton which is up \$1 from last year and \$50-\$65 per ton shipping. No motion or approval needed since this is a budgeted item.

### Velo in the Ville

This is a fundraiser supporting Margaret Mary Health in Batesville. The group have six optional courses with riders traveling various distances. The group has asked permission to enter the lake and stop at the main beach and restaurant for a water/restroom break as well as the option to eat at the Sea Shack. The group would be set up giving out waters

etc. The request needs approval from the Board to enter a private subdivision. The request was granted on a motion from Polly and seconded by Carol.

# Nominating Committee

Dick presented the slate for approval for the nominating committee for the upcoming annual Board meeting and vote for Board of Directors. The committee nominees are: Robert Cupp, Robert Jackman, Debbie Evans, Rosemary Kinnett, and Ed Fox. There will be three open board positions with the option of a few members to run again. The nominating committee was approved and accepted on a motion by Mike, seconded by Carol.

## **MANAGER'S REPORT**

Brad informed the audience that on March 22 there was a main sewer line rupture. The maintenance crew worked until 12:30 am, (a 14 hour day), to keep this controlled and get the situation fixed. Brad gave kudos to our crew for their hard work and dedication.

There was no contamination from the rupture. Nice job gentlemen!

Brad stated that dues were supposed to be turned into the office by March 1<sup>st</sup> and were late after April 1<sup>st</sup>. The lake has around 87% of property owners paid to date. This is excellent! Only 79 property owners still unpaid at present time.

Brad stated that the new property tax deeds have been drafted, recorded and filed and a letter requesting the common property exemption was filed with the Assessor's Office prior to the April 1<sup>st</sup> deadline.

The lake was able to sell another property, lot 1426, to the property owner next door. Heavy trash is scheduled for May 7 - 15 and the summer trash / recycle center hours begin May 16.

The Lake will receive its first treatment for algae on April 27 by Aquatic Control. Mowing dates are set for May 16, July 1, and August 16.

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

# Lake Santee Regional Waste & Water District Meeting Minutes

Meeting of March 17, 2016 3:30 PM Lake Santee Community Room

### 1. Roll Call

Scott Gibbs called the meeting to order and requested a roll call. Members present were Scott Gibbs, Jim Hornig, Paul Gosnell, Greg Montgomery, Frank Erdosy, and Kathy Tarzwell. Also in attendance were Brad Jones, Utility Administrator and Brandon Litmer, Utility Superintendent. Not present was Clair Fredrickson.

#### Consent Items

- a. Minutes from February 18, 2016
- b. Financial Reports
- c. Register of Claims for sewer operating
- d. Register of Claims for water operating

A motion was made by Frank and seconded by Kathy to accept the consent items. Motion carried.

## 3. Operator's Report

- a. Sewer Status Report Brandon reported that the Sewer Plant is operating on a normal basis with no problems and all tests normal. Some ground water is infiltrating into the system from the heavy rains, but has not been an issue.
- b. Water Status Report Brandon reported that the Water Plant is operating well and all tests continue to be really good since the carbon replacement. The HAA5 test was under the limit, but the 4-quarter average will be above the limit because of the previous high test readings – this is a carryover from the carbon issues from last summer.
  - i. EVOQUA supplied the bad carbon The District's attorney has sent a letter to Evoqua related to the bad carbon they supplied. As previously reported in the last three months' minutes, as a result of the water bypassing the carbon tanks during this issue, the November HAA5 test results were above the limit, similar to the May tests. IDEM was notified of the test results and they indicated they would be sending us a notice to distribute to our customers when this notice is received, it will immediately be sent out to all customers this notice has not yet been received. All test results have been and continue to be in compliance since the carbon was replaced in December, including the HAA5 test results noted above.
  - ii. Water tower inspection / cleaning The tower will be inspected and cleaned on March 22<sup>nd</sup>. Pressure in the system will be maintained by running the pumps. After the tower is refilled, Brandon will perform some tests, confirm that the results pass, and the tower will be put back into operation.
  - iii. Flushing of distribution system Once the tower inspection and cleaning is complete, the entire distribution system will be flushed. This will take 5-6 days, depending on weather.
- c. Upcoming Conferences / Training Classes Brandon will attend IDEM's Net-DMR class in March.

### 4. Administrator's Report

- Status Report Brad reported there were 24 credit card transactions, 139 ACHs, 4 valve turns and 1 shut off.
- b. Write-Offs There was 1 write off lot 1616 for \$2.74. A motion was made by Greg and seconded by Jim to write this off. Motion carried. A request was received for relief on the water bill for lot 737 for a water leak. This request will be discussed further at the next meeting after further information is received.
- c. Correspondence A letter was received from lot 364 with several questions related to the District. The lot owner, Mr. Amos, attended the meeting and his questions were discussed and answered. Thanks goes to Mr. Amos for his interest in the utility and his interesting questions.
- d. SBOA Update Brad finished the report to SBOA on the Gateway system and submitted our information similar to the past. Have not heard anything back yet from the SBOA whether we provided too much information again.
- e. Miscellaneous Agency Reporting none this month.
- 5. Attorney's Report We have to have the internal control standards in place by June 30<sup>th</sup>. Brad will ask Ann if anyone else has completed this system of checks and balances.

### 6. Committee Reports

- a. Board Member Guide Committee Board Training Topic Scott distributed maps of the local area to discuss potential expansion to neighboring communities of the District's utilities. With the lack of density nearby, there doesn't appear to be any great opportunities to expand right now.
- b. Volunteers / topics for training need volunteers.

#### 7. Old Business

a. Napoleon Water – Brandon received some preliminary plans from Gene. He marked them up and returned to Gene for revision.

### 8. New Business

- a. ACH Frank is heading up an effort to continue educating our customers about the benefits of ACH and has put together another information page to be placed in the Smoke Signals again this month.
- b. Management Agreement Updated Information The amounts related to differential payments that were previously agreed to in December were reviewed and confirmed to remain as stated in the Management Agreement.
