Not all mosquitoes are the same. Different mosquitoes spread different viruses and bite at different times of the day.

Mosquito-proof your home

 - » Once a week, empty and scrub, turn over, cover, or throw out items that hold water, such as tires, buckets, planters, toys, pools, birdbaths, flowerpots, or trash containers. Check inside and outside your home.

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

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
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

LAKE SANTEE BASS TOURNAMENT MAY 15, 2016

Well, our second tournament of the 2016 season is complete and it's starting to sound like a broken record! Lake Santee continues to produce limits of largemouth bass that rival legendary fisheries like Barkley and Kentucky Lake, Bull Shoals, and even many of the famous Florida lakes like Lake Okeechobee.

Member Rob Merriman and his partner, T.J. Edwards placed a five bass limit on the scales that weighed 21.3 pounds to take the win. That's over a four pound per bass average and didn't even include the event's big bass. The father/son duo of Butch and Marco Mikesell finished a strong second with 18.1 lbs. while the Miller brothers, Phil and Dustin, landed in third place with 15.06 pounds of largemouth bass. The big bass of the tournament went to Chris Roberts and his partner Adam Engleking for a 6.12 lb. trophy.

In overall totals, the nineteen teams brought 144 pounds to the scales with a total of 43 keeper bass caught. That is nearly a 3 1/2 pound average per bass! Each and every one of those fish were successfully released back into the lake to be caught again and again! Also, as one can tell, record numbers of teams are participating in each month's event, a continuing sign of the popularity of bass tournament fishing at Lake Santee.

The winners and Big Bass champs took home beautiful plaques donated by Mark Wickens of Nationwide Insurance in Greensburg. Thank you, Mark, for your generosity and support of our events!

Our next event is June 26th and will start at 6:00 AM. Mark your calendars now and plan to take part in the fun, and, as always, <u>PLEASE PRACTICE CATCH AND RELEASE</u> with Lake Santee's bass and remember to take a child fishing!!!

WANTED BULLHEAD CATFISH




Lake Santee is experiencing an unwanted increase in its number of bullhead catfish. Unlike Channel Catfish, Bullheads are an undesirable fish whose size remains small, and can quickly overpopulate. Bullheads are bottom feeders that stir up bottom sediments, which can increase turbidity, and add to our water clarity issues. Channel Catfish can be easily distinguished from Bullheads by their deeply forked tail. Anglers, please remove all Bullhead Catfish that you catch. Thank you, Lake and Beaches Committee.

Zebra Mussel (Dreissena polymorpha)



Zebra mussels (*Dreissena polymorpha*) are prolific invaders that cost the U.S. billions of dollar each year. These small mussels from Eurasia can clog water intakes and damage equipment by attaching to boat motors and hard surfaces. They can damage ecosystems by harming fisheries, smothering native mussels and crayfish, and littering beaches with their sharp shells.

In the late 1980s, zebra mussels spread from Europe to the Great Lakes in contaminated ballast water discharged from foreign ships. From there, they expanded to the Mississippi River, its tributaries, and to inland lakes. Zebra mussels spread primarily by attaching to boat hulls, aquatic plants, nets, fishing equipment, or in water. Adult zebra mussels can survive out of water for days under certain conditions. Your actions are vital to prevent their spread.

General Characteristics

- Zebra mussels look like small clams with a yellowish or brownish "D"-shaped shell, usually with dark and light-colored stripes (hence the name "zebra")
- They can be up to two inches long, but most are under one inch. Zebra mussels usually grow in clusters containing numerous individuals and are generally found in shallow (6-30 feet), algae-rich water
- Zebra mussels are the only freshwater mollusc that can firmly attach itself to solid objects submerged rocks, dock pilings, boat hulls, water intake pipes, etc.
- On smooth surfaces, young zebra mussels feel like fine sandpaper.
- Juveniles are about the size of peppercorns.



What You Can Do

- Learn to recognize zebra mussels.
- **Inspect** and **remove** aquatic plants, animals, and mud from boat, motor, and trailer.
- **Drain** water from boat, motor, livewell, bilge, and bait containers.
- **Dispose** of unwanted live bait and worms in the trash.
- **Rinse** boat and equipment with high-pressure and/or hot water (104° F), especially if moored for over a day, **OR**
- **Dry** everything for at least 5 days.
- Never introduce fish, plants, crayfish, snails or clams from one body of water to another.
- **Report** new sightings note exact location; place specimens in a sealed plastic bag or store in rubbing (isopropyl) alcohol.

Know the rules!

Unauthorized introduction of zebra mussels, fish, or plants into the wild is illegal. Protect your property and our waters.



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

Birding 101 – the fourth in a series for Lake Santee Birders Red birds in the Neighborhood

Possibly the most popular and most recognized bird here is the State Bird of Indiana, the (1) Northern Cardinal. It's a year round bird so its bright red feathers and black mask highlight snow covered landscapes and summer gardens alike. They are common at the feeders but will also eat fruit and insects. The female also has a black mask but is largely buff brown withy tinges of red on her wings and crest. Two birds that flash red and can be easily mistaken for each other are the (2) House Finch and the (3) Purple Finch. These birds are smaller than the Cardinal and mostly brown. The House Finch displays orange-red on its face, chest and rump. Its white belly is streaked with brown. It has a rusty cap. The Purple Finch is rosier in color and has a red cap and clear red breast. It is usually seen only in winter at Lake Santee. The Purple Finch may travel in large flocks that come down from the north to feed. They both visit feeding stations so it's easier to distinguish them if you can spot them together. Happy birding!

When it rains, it pours, usually on the first Wednesday of June!

Once again Friends of Wildlife had a delightful evening of socializing and sharing good food for our annual cookout and pitch-in. Once again, as has become customary, storm clouds rolled in, thunder and lightning powered up and rain poured down at the time we were to meet at Jackson's Nursery Outdoor Kitchen and Butterfly Garden. Thanks to Rhonda Jackson for her gardening tips and inspiring program about Starfysh, (www.Starfysh.org) an organization that is doing post-earthquake community develop work on the island of La Gonave off the coast of Haiti. Under the direction of Dr. Steve Edmundson the islanders with volunteer help are creating an economy based on sustainable agriculture practices while developing programs to improve health and education. The door prizes donated by Rhonda were won by Clair Fredrickson, Dallas Whipple, John

Seright and John Kobeske. Rhonda also donated 3 plants for the Habitat Butterfly Gardens. Thank you, Rhonda for being a good friend to Friends of Wildlife.

The Nature Habitat

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

MEMBER INTRODUCTIONS AND COMMENTS

Meeting of May 19, 2016 3:30 PM Lake Santee Community Room

1. Roll Call

Scott Gibbs called the meeting to order and requested a roll call. Members present were Scott Gibbs, Jim Hornig, Paul Gosnell, Greg Montgomery, Frank Erdosy, Clair Fredrickson and Kathy Tarzwell. Also in attendance were Brad Jones, Utility Administrator and Brandon Litmer, Utility Superintendent.

2. Consent Items

- a. Minutes from April 21, 2016.
- b. Financial Reports
- c. Register of Claims for sewer operating
- d. Register of Claims for water operating

A motion was made by Frank and seconded by Clair to accept the consent items. Motion carried.

3. Operator's Report

- a. Sewer Status Report Brandon reported that the Sewer Plant is operating on a normal basis with no problems. The pump calls are still low. There was a leak between the Fire Station and the Maintenance Building and it is repaired.
- b. Water Status Report Brandon reported that the Water Plant is operating well with all tests in a normal range. The membranes are also operating well.
 - i. EVOQUA supplied the bad carbon We still have not heard anything back from Evoqua relating to the letter that we had Anne send. Brad will contact her to see if there is anything further we need to do at this point.
- c. Upcoming Conferences / Training Classes Brad went to the "Efficient Utility Management and Utility Self-Assessment" training class. They talked about helpful ways to look at developing reserve accounts for replacing old infrastructure. Brad found the training quite useful as our underground water lines are the original lines installed when the lake was first developed; and, we have been discussing that very topic recently. Even though the underground lines are still working fine today, we need to plan for future repairs and replacements as these lines approach 50 years old. Brandon and Frank have been working on updating equipment replacement costs to incorporate into the reserve account planning.

4. Administrator's Report

- a. Status Report Brad reported there were 19 credit card transactions, 136 ACHs, 9 valve turns and 6 shut offs.
- b. Write-Offs / Adjustments Lot 75 asked for an adjustment of \$534.71 last month. After reading the ordinance and some discussion, it was decided to grant the adjustment. A motion was made by Kathy and seconded by Greg to approve the adjustment. Motion carried.
- c. Correspondence The renewal for the liability insurance came and it has gone up about 10% in the last 3 years. Brad is going to get 2 other quotes to see if our current policy/rates are still competitive.
- d. Miscellaneous Agency Reporting none this month.

5. Attorney's Report – None this month.

6. Committee Reports

 a. Board Member Guide Committee – Board Training Topic – Kathy gave a report on the government agencies we deal with and what each agency is responsible for. Greg is scheduled to conduct the training in June.

7. Old Business

- a. Napoleon Water Brandon talked to Gene and he is still working up the costs for the emergency cross-connection.
- b. ACH program education Frank would like to set up a table at the July 4th activities to educate everyone about our ACH program and have forms there for sign up if anyone is interested. LSPOA board approval is necessary for a table for that date.
- c. Internal Controls Standards Brad has reviewed the requirements and has drafted an outline. He will have something for review at the June meeting. A resolution adopting these Standards will be required.

8. New Business

a. Consumer Confidence Report – This needs to be mailed out by July 1st. This is an annual mailing to all customers that reports the water quality testing results for the year.

The Automated Clearing House (ACH) is an electronic network that allows banks and other financial institutions to quickly and easily clear electronic payments. The network is governed by operating rules and guidelines developed by the National Automated Clearing House Association.

Is ACH Secure?

ACH transactions occur electronically and automatically, which dramatically reduces the number of individuals who have access to personal or financial information. Since ACH transactions are electronic they cannot be misplaced, lost in the mail or stolen.

How do I sign-up?

Signing up is easy – there are 2 ways. Go to the Lake Santee website (lake-santee.com), select Regional Waste & Water District, and then click on Governing Documents and Forms. Complete the Authorization Agreement for Direct Payments form and send the completed form to the RWWD Office.

OR, stop by the office and fill out the form there.

Recurring payments only need to be authorized once, prior to the first transaction. No further authorization is required to continue making payments to an account through the ACH.

Will I still receive a bill?

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
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

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
