

Mosquito-proof your home





- Use screens on windows and doors. Repair holes in screens to keep mosquitoes outside.

- Keep mosquitoes from laying eggs in and near standing water.
 - » Once a week, empty and scrub, turn over, cover, or throw out items that hold water, such as tires, buckets, planters, toys, pools, birdbaths, flowerpots, or trash containers. Check inside and outside your home.

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
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

Twenty-one teams turned out to take part in the event on a beautiful day, the largest number of participants since before the devastating fish kill in 2004. As most members can tell, the participation numbers continue to grow because of the fabulous fishery that our Lake Santee nurtures. The average size of a bass weighed in this event was over 3 pounds each and my goodness, are they healthy bass! Of the day's twenty-one teams, fifteen chose the option to also take part in the USA Bassin' portion of the event. When everything was said and done over **\$1600** in cash was presented to our top placing teams. Not a bad way to spend the day, chasing a little green fish!...

The brother team of Phil and Dustin Miller took first place with five beautiful bass that weighed 15.11 lbs. The father/son duo of Jon and Doug Ohlmansiek managed to hold onto second place with three bass which totaled 10.12 pounds. Chuck Sieg and Paul Bruns caught three keeper bass which weighed 9.90 pounds for a solid third place finish. Their catch also included the tournament's Big Bass, a 5.12 lb. lunker.

Our winners and Big Bass champ also took home beautiful plaques graciously donated by the fine folks at Klosterkemper Tax Service in Greensburg. (Thank you Mary Hamer!!) Along those lines, if you are in need of any type of awards, take a minute to check out Kramer Kreations, also in Greensburg, they do fantastic work.

Lake rules state that the minimum size limit for largemouth bass to be kept is 21 inches. WANTED BULLHEAD CATFISH



Lake Santee is experiencing an unwanted increase in its number of bullhead catfish. Unlike Channel Catfish, Bullheads are an undesirable fish whose size remains small, and can quickly overpopulate. Bullheads are bottom feeders that stir up bottom sediments, which can increase turbidity, and add to our water clarity issues. Channel Catfish can be easily distinguished from Bullheads by their deeply forked tail. Anglers, please remove all Bullhead Catfish that you catch. Thank you, Lake and Beaches Committee.

Zebra Mussel (Dreissena polymorpha)

Zebra mussels (*Dreissena polymorpha*) are prolific invaders that cost the U.S. billions of dollar each year. These small mussels from Eurasia can clog water intakes and damage equipment by attaching to boat motors and hard surfaces. They can damage ecosystems by harming fisheries, smothering native mussels and crayfish, and littering beaches with their sharp shells.

In the late 1980s, zebra mussels spread from Europe to the Great Lakes in contaminated ballast water discharged from foreign ships. From there, they expanded to the Mississippi River, its tributaries, and to inland lakes. Zebra mussels spread primarily by attaching to boat hulls, aquatic plants, nets, fishing equipment, or in water. Adult zebra mussels can survive out of water for days under certain conditions. Your actions are vital to prevent their spread.

General Characteristics

- Zebra mussels look like small clams with a yellowish or brownish "D"-shaped shell, usually with dark and light-colored stripes (hence the name "zebra")
- They can be up to two inches long, but most are under one inch. Zebra mussels usually grow in clusters containing numerous individuals and are generally found in shallow (6-30 feet), algae-rich water
- Zebra mussels are the only freshwater mollusc that can firmly attach itself to solid objects submerged rocks, dock pilings, boat hulls, water intake pipes, etc.
- On smooth surfaces, young zebra mussels feel like fine sandpaper.
- Juveniles are about the size of peppercorns.



What You Can Do

- Learn to recognize zebra mussels.
- **Inspect** and **remove** aquatic plants, animals, and mud from boat, motor, and trailer.
- **Drain** water from boat, motor, livewell, bilge, and bait containers.
- **Dispose** of unwanted live bait and worms in the trash.
- **Rinse** boat and equipment with high-pressure and/or hot water (104° F), especially if moored for over a day, **OR**
- Dry everything for at least 5 days.
- Never introduce fish, plants, crayfish, snails or clams from one body of water to another.
- Report new sightings note exact location; place specimens in a sealed plastic bag or store in rubbing (isopropyl) alcohol.

Know the rules!

Unauthorized introduction of zebra mussels, fish, or plants into the wild is illegal. Protect your property and our waters.



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
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

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ROAD MAINTENACE AT THE LAKE

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The Board contracted with King's Asphalt [See their ad on page 111] to do this paving. They are using a different formula than the Asphalt Material that is normally used. They take used asphalt, chop it into very fine granules and then heat it in the application process. A heavier roller than what is normally used then compresses it to the surface and gives it a smooth surface. While the road can be driven on immediately, it will cure out with time and become a harder material. For those of us who live on a gravel road we say a great big THANK YOU to the Board.

Birding 101 - The Third in a series for Lake Santee Birders

A Special Visitor and Birds that eat Bugs

A very prominent visitor to add to your Bird Identification Notebook this spring is the (1) Rose-Breasted Grosbeak. More commonly seen in northern Indiana, unusual numbers of them have been visiting local feeders and staying around for a longer time. Their migration from Mexico, Central and South America ends as far as north central Canada for breeding. A little smaller than a Robin, this flashy black and white bird with a red triangular bib might be confused with a woodpecker (Smoke Signals March 2016) accept for its thick beak (hence the name grosbeak) and compact body. Besides seed they also eat insects and fruit. The female is a brown bird, not to be confused with a sparrow or female finch because it is larger and has a distinctive eyebrow mark. There are also Blue Grosbeaks (larger than an Indigo Bunting) and Evening Grosbeaks (larger than a Goldfinch) that are even more uncommon in this area. If you spot one, report it to a birder right away!! An insect eater popular among birders is the (2) Purple Martin. About the size of a Robin, it is the largest swallow in North America. Its purple head, back and belly give it its name and the forked tail makes it easy to spot in flight doing its aerial acrobatics while snapping up insects. In Indiana it nests almost exclusively in man-made apartment complexes, sometimes within 100 feet of human dwellings. They like to gather in social groups and return to the same nesting site each year. Another great insect control agent is the (3) Tree Swallow (Smoke Signals April 2016.) It returns earlier in the spring than other swallows. Their dark blue upper parts contrast sharply with white under parts and really flash in the sun as they dive for insects over water and land. Only about half the size of a Robin at 5-6", males and females are similar. If you have nesting boxes in your habitat they may be raising families in your own back yard. (4) Barn Swallows are mosquito eaters too, although they also eat beetles, wasps and flies. They are about 7" in size and show steel blue back and wings with a chestnut colored breast and belly. These swallows are in constant motion and so very hard to photograph.



President Veach called for a review of the minutes of the April 13, 2016 meeting. The minutes were approved on a motion by Carol, seconded by Polly.

Angel Hocker gave a brief review of the Treasurer's report. The Treasurer's report was approved subject to audit.

Dick explained that a portion of the Treasurer's Report is in bad debt of \$630.00 (under line 605 on budget statements), and asked for a motion to write it off. A settlement had been made on a bad debt and \$1,800 was collected in the settlement. The write off was approved on a motion by Carol, seconded by Ron.

After presentation, the bills were approved for payment on a motion by Carol, seconded by Mike.

MEMBER INTRODUCTIONS AND COMMENTS

Members were asked to introduce themselves and were given the opportunity to express comments.

Buddy Suiters gave the only member comment and stated that the North entrance looks very nice.

CORRESPONDENCE

Brad stated that he received some correspondence from Ryan King who is wanting to place a slider dock attachment on a rented dock area. This would be attached to a seawall and would be so that he could get his boat up out of the water. After some discussion the Board agreed not to allow this based on Rule 4.18 that states rented docks will have no lifts or fixtures attached.

Another member asked about multiple slip rentals, and specifically how many slips a member can rent. Dick stated that there was no set limit, but there were set processes. The Board discussed the issue and is leaning towards limiting the number of slips rented per member. After more discussion, the Board decided they will amend the policy to state a limit of two per member.

Recreation – Carol Goodwin

Carol started by saying she still is searching for someone to run or help with the corn hole tournaments. No one has yet stepped up, and Carol does not know how to do this. Carol explained that she has planned some children's activities for the same day as the Clarksburg Christian Church event.

Carol was sad to say that she has had to cancel several events due to rain and cold weather. Dan Mobley traveled from Florida to play here at the Lake. This event has been rescheduled for August 6 along with rescheduling a few other events to follow suit. Matrix is scheduled for this upcoming Saturday, and yet again the weather looks bad. After some discussion, the Board decided to cancel this event due to weather.

Carol also announced that on July 3, the Ladies of the Lake (LOL) will be hosting a boat parade and will be providing food for the youth fishing tournament. This event needed board approval. The event was approved on a motion from David, seconded by Mike.

The rest of the recreation schedule will be posted in the Smoke Signal.

Lakes & Beaches – David Martin

David discussed information concerning the refinishing of the main beach umbrellas. David received a bid from KFAB for the price of refurbishing for the amount of \$1,400 plus another \$300 for netting to go under the umbrellas that would keep the birds from nesting under the umbrellas. Audience members asked how long the netting would last. There was some discussion, but no one had a solid answer. Nancy Fredrickson asked if the umbrellas were still under warranty and stated she thought there maybe be some left. The Office has been unable to find any records on the umbrellas. The Board decided to have KFAB go ahead and complete work on one umbrella and get firm pricing on the refurbishing. Dick stated that the umbrellas are an icon of the lake and we want to keep them up and looking nice.

Clean Up – Jim Massingale

No report at this time. Jim did state that there are numerous brush piles around the lake and that when the rain stops, he hopes members get rid of those piles.

Roads & Maintenance - Ron Day

Ron stated that the North entrance looks good. He informed the audience that the electricity is installed, the message board is delivered and will be installed soon. Cameras are installed and working at both entrances. Millings are complete now as well. Ron explained that this time when they put millings down, they chopped them up to a finer grade, heated them, and rolled them with a heavier roller. This helped them to pack down better. Speed bumps will be installed soon on Tass Trail. Maintenance laid rip rap along the ditch on the east side of the North entrance to try to support the sides of the road. Millings will also be used on a few more roads this yet this month. Pueblo Trail /Santee Drive down to Niagara, and Itawamba will be resurfaced with millings using the same process as the North entrance. During the summer months, maintenance will also be working on the gravel roads, and getting some areas fixed with geo tech and gravel.

Security - Mike Cutrufelli

Mike thanked security for all of their work. Mike again asked residents to watch for the school bus as the year comes to a close and follow speed limit signs. Full report in the Smoke Signal. Mike stated that Brad is working on ordering two smartphones for use by our security. These phones will allow them a quicker response time in emergencies.

Mike also advised residents to not purchase a Knox Box from Amazon but to make sure boxes bought are true Knox Box products.

Dick explained that the discussion about the Knox Box came about because we had an older resident that needed emergency services and they were not able to get into the house. The Knox Box allows emergency personnel to have a key to access the house in case of emergency without damage to any door etc.

Dick also wanted to say that one of the security guards stopped a resident and gave them a speeding ticket. He said that there is a rumor or perception that the Board does not support security giving out tickets, and he wanted to make sure that members understand this is completely false. Dick stated that it is a privilege to live here and the #1 concern is safety of residents, both on roads and the water. He asked members to call in speeders. Dick stated that security patrolled 300 hours and gave 2 warnings and one ticket. Jim Hornig stated that if residents are going to call in a speeder, to try to know who it is. By the time security gets there, the speeder is gone. Dick again thanked security for the ticket and stated he would love to see them give more.

Jim Hornig also stated that the Lake is going to great lengths to make our roads nice, and residents need to take care of them. He said as soon as the new millings were laid, someone was doing donuts and trying to tear them up. If residents see this, call it in.

OLD BUSINESS

Dick discussed the Women's Club ideas presented at the last meeting and the Boards thoughts on the suggestions. Dick reminded the attendees that the Women's Club had thrown out some suggestions of projects that they would be happy to help fund.

The first suggestion was to help pay for the umbrella reconstruction by purchasing the netting to be used underneath each umbrella. This netting would help keep birds from building nests in the umbrellas and would help keep the beach clean. The Board loves this idea and would like to thank the Women's Club for the financial assistance on this project.

The second suggestion was to place ceiling fans on the underside of the deck, just outside the Community Room. Dick explained that there are a couple of problems with this. First, the area is not high or tall enough and the fans would create a hazard with people hitting their heads, and that electricity would have to be run, and fans would have to be mounted, which in turn means putting holes in the covering. The Board feels this is not something we want to do.

The last suggestion was in creating a dog park. Dick explained that the liability would be too high on something like this. If someone or someone's dog was to be injured by another dog, it could turn out bad for the Lake. The bBard is not interested in doing this at this time.

NEW BUSINESS

Clarksburg Christian Church luncheon will be held June 11th in the Community Room. Carol stated they are requesting approval from the Board to have a bounce house and other activities. Carol would like recreation to support this event by including children's activities and make it community event. All of the extras for the event (bounce house, etc.) were approved on a motion by Carol, and seconded by Mike. Brad stated that the lake has been given the certificate of insurance for the bounce house, etc.

The Booster Club has previously offered to purchase and donate another dock to be placed at the main beach area. This dock would not be for rent but would be a public access dock. This came about because there is not enough docking space for people to use during the fishing tournaments or just busy weekends. Maintenance has moved one dock to the main beach area, and the Booster Club has donated a second for the other side. Again, these are not reserved areas, but are for public use. The Board accepted this gift on a motion by Carol, and seconded by Mike. The Board has agreed to take care of the upkeep on the dock, and thanks the Booster Club for their generous gift. Dick stated the tournaments are growing events and have large numbers of participants.

LSPOA BOARD MEETING MINUTES CONT'D.

MANAGER'S REPORT

Brad stated that the Lake sold three more lots this past month.

Brad also announced that there have been 20 young people and one adult apply for summer gate guard and beach attendant positions. This is good since we are going to post guards at both the Main Entrance and the North Entrance, as well as the Main Beach area.

Brad reminded residents that on May 21st Margaret Mary Health Foundation is hosting the *Vélo in the Ville* fundraiser and that there will be participants biking to the Lake. These bikers will not be going around the subdivision but will be coming into the Lake and stopping at the Main Beach area for the restroom and refreshments. Brad has received the certificate of insurance for this event.

Brad encourages residents to continue to check the Facebook page and the website for announcements, pictures, and community happenings.

Before the meeting closed, Dick announced that there is a resident in need of some help to get her pontoon boat launched. Mrs. Schroeder needs someone with a trailer who would be willing to put her boat in the water for her. Call the Lake office.

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

Meeting of April 21, 2016 3:30 PM Lake Santee Community Room

1. Roll Call

Scott Gibbs called the meeting to order and requested a roll call. Members present were Scott Gibbs, Jim Hornig, Paul Gosnell, Greg Montgomery, Frank Erdosy, Clair Fredrickson and Kathy Tarzwell. Also in attendance were Brad Jones, Utility Administrator, Brandon Litmer, Utility Superintendent, and Anne Poindexter, the District's attorney.

2. Consent Items

- a. Minutes from March 17, 2016
- b. Financial Reports
- c. Register of Claims for sewer operating
- d. Register of Claims for water operating

A motion was made by Kathy and seconded by Greg to accept the consent items. Motion carried.

3. Operator's Report

- a. Sewer Status Report Brandon reported that the Sewer Plant is operating on a normal basis with no problems and all tests normal. Pump calls have been low and Brandon will order more pumps for the new homes being built.
- b. Water Status Report Brandon reported that the Water Plant is operating well with all the tests in a normal range. The membranes are operating well also.
 - i. EVOQUA supplied the bad carbon We still have not heard anything from Evoqua. Ann stated we need to notify them to pick up the bad carbon.
 - ii. IDEM notification letter The notification letter from IDEM for the November 2015 HAA5 test results was finally received. This public notice, along with some additional information to answer the anticipated questions, will be put in the Smoke Signals and on the website. Brandon has already coordinated with the Smoke Signals to get this included.
 - iii. Water tower inspection/cleaning The tower was cleaned and inspected on 3/22/16. The tank was not too dirty and looked good inside according to Dixon. Dixon will forward a full report. Records indicate the "wet" portion of the water tank was last painted in 1993 and the "dry" portion in 2006. Dixon will include recommendations on future painting in their report.
 - iv. Flushing of the distribution system The entire system was flushed, completing on 4/12/16.
- c. Upcoming Conferences / Training Classes There is an "Efficient Utility Management and Utility Self-Assessment" training course in Connersville on 5/4/16. Brad and Frank will plan to attend that training.

4. Administrator's Report

- a. Status Report Brad reported there were 14 credit card transactions, 139 ACHs, 9 valve turns and 1 shut off.
- b. Write-Offs There was one write off for lot 1665 for \$37.57, a bank-owned property that has now been sold. A motion was made by Frank and seconded by Kathy to write this off amount. Motion carried

Adjustments – Lot 285 requested an invoice adjustment of \$401.23 and lot 1238

requested an invoice adjustment of \$409.16; both for frozen/broken pipes. A motion was made by Frank and seconded by Kathy to make the adjustments. Motion carried. Lot 75 requested an invoice adjustment for a running toilet, and after discussion, this will be tabled for next month to further review the Ordinance related to this issue.

- c. Correspondence A letter from the US Census Bureau was received and Brad responded on-line. We received a letter from the State of Indiana stating we no longer have to file a resource report per HB347. We received a letter from LSPOA offering to split the cost of a Greensburg paper subscription for use in District business. Greg made a motion that we pay half of the bill and it was seconded by Jim. Motion carried.
- d. Miscellaneous Agency Reporting none this month.
- 5. Attorney's Report Anne's letterhead will be changing, as CKP is dividing up. Anne has not received any response from Evoqua she and Brad will follow up next week.
- 6. Committee Reports
 - a. Board Member Guide Committee Board Training Topic none this month.
 - b. Volunteers / topics for training Kathy will conduct the training in May; Greg is scheduled for June.

7. Old Business

- a. Napoleon Water Brandon met with Gene from Napoleon to further discuss the emergency cross-connection. The current plan is for the new pit to be pretty near our water main. Each utility would pay for the cost of the new pipe from their main to the new pit with the cost of the pit being split equally. This should make our cost around \$10,000; this is still preliminary.
- b. ACH program education Frank would like to continue putting informational newsletters in the Smoke Signals to educate customers about the ease of the ACH payment option. Anne will look into whether the District can do some type of drawing or prize to incent customers to sign up.

8. New Business

 a. Internal Controls Standards – Brad has reviewed the requirements and has drafted an outline. He will have something for review at the May meeting. A resolution adopting these Standards will be required.

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
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
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
