1. Call to Order / Roll Call

President Paul Gosnell called the meeting to order and requested a roll call. Members present were Paul Gosnell, Clair Fredrickson, Scott Gibbs, Kathy Tarzwell, and Jim Hornig. Members participating electronically were zero. Absent were Frank Erdosy and Larry Kiernan. Also in attendance were Utility Administrator Brittany Green, Utility Superintendent Brandon Litmer, and the District's attorney Anne Poindexter.

Guest introduction and short comments (two minutes max)

Guests included Vicki Wilson, Claude Livesay, Rhonda Peetz, and Dick Veach.

No comments at this time.

2. Consent Items

- a. Minutes of October 18, 2018 Meeting
- b. Minutes of October 18, 2018 Special Meeting
- c. Financial Report
- d. Register of Claims Water
- e. Register of Claims Sewer

A motion was made by Kathy and seconded by Clair to accept the consent items as presented. Motion carried.

3. Superintendent Report

- a. Sewer Status Report
 - i. Brandon reported that everything is operating well, and all tests are normal.
- b. Water Status Report
 - i. The water plant is operating on a normal basis with no problems and all tests in the normal range.
 - ii. The quarterly disinfection by-products (DBP) samples were collected and sent out to the lab for testing.
 - iii. The internal heater on the sampler on the incoming effluent line is starting to fail and lines are freezing up. Brandon obtained 2 quotes to replace this equipment and the proposals were discussed. A motion was made by Jim and seconded by Scott to accept the proposal from DL Anderson for \$7437 for the vendor to furnish and install the new sampler. Motion carried.

4. Administrator Report

- a. Status report
 - i. 8 shuts offs, all back on.
 - ii. The office is continuing to train the new employee and review processes.
 - iii. There has been no further feedback from the SBOA following their audit.
 - iv. No complaints this month.
 - v. There were 38 accounts that came up on the leak detection report. All customers on this report were contacted.
- b. Write-offs / adjustments None this month.

c. Miscellaneous

- i. Brittany explained the circumstances behind an invoice that has been created for termination of service for \$252.88 at Lot 210/211 and this process requires Board approval. A motion was made by Jim and seconded by Scott to approve this invoice as presented. Motion carried.
- ii. Brittany stated that she is currently researching alternate credit card processing services for the POA; and, now for the RWWD, too.

5. Treasurer Report

- a. Update
 - FDIC coverage Shawn (our accountant) told Kathy that the SBOA provides the equivalent of FDIC insurance on utility accounts like ours, so it has been confirmed our banking accounts do have the needed protection.
- 6. Attorney's Report see below.

7. Old Business

- a. Property Sale Lots 517, 518, and 519 no update.
- b. Wet Lands Project Paul attended the last Salt-Pipe Creek Watershed Program meeting. At this meeting, there was conversation about guidelines for chemical applications to yards near bodies of water and streams. We discussed that maybe the RWWD or POA should put reminders in the Smoke Signals about this, as well.
- c. Napoleon Water Update
 - i. Paul reported that the land owner has not made himself available to meet with Paul to review the work and sign the easement.

d. Water Availability Billing

- i. Frank and Larry authored another draft (10/22/18) of a potential policy change related to the way availability fees are assessed. Paul had reviewed this draft prior to the meeting and brought his own revisions and distributed them at the meeting. There is still not consensus on whether a change should be made; and, if so, what that change should entail.
- ii. Picking up from the last meeting, there was further discussion about the intent of the RWWD's Governing Documents and the precedent that has been set through billing practice over the life of the utility.
- iii. Some of the Board still believe that the availability fees have been billed incorrectly in the past and would like to institute a change where each vacant lot would be billed separately. Others on the Board believe that each vacant lot is not supposed to be billed separately and are in favor of keeping the billing process unchanged; where a customer pays either a bill for a "metered" service or a customer pays a bill for "water availability", but not both. Rhonda Peetz confirmed again at this meeting that this was the billing practice of the RWWD from when she used to work in the office, saying that

a customer received either a blue (availability) invoice or a green (metered service) invoice, but not both. Currently, a customer pays 1 availability fee regardless of the number of vacant lots owned; Brittany reiterated that it appears this practice has not been applied consistently.


- iv. Scott reminded the Board of what Darrow McCreary shared at last month's meeting, that from the beginning in 1965, salesmen would tell prospective land buyers that you only pay 1 set of dues and 1 water availability fee, no matter how many lots you own.

- vi. It was again decided to table this topic until the next meeting and move on to the next agenda item. Paul said he would like to reach some type of resolution at the next meeting.

 - i. Both Clair Fredrickson and Scott Gibbs have terms that end on 12/31/18 and both have decided to not renew for another four-year term. There were four names discussed to replace the two open positions. Scott nominated Claude Livesay and Dick Veach to fill the two open positions. A motion was made by Scott and seconded by Jim to approve the nomination. Motion carried. Clair and Jim will attend the County Commissioners meeting on 12/3/18 and present the names for the appointments.

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

Winter and Spring Activities for 2019

January 2nd is declared a snow day! We will not have our regular meeting. Stay home, be safe and keep warm! Don't forget to fill the feeders and be sure that water is available for the critters.

February – Great Backyard Bird Count, February 16-19. Get your binoculars out and become a citizen scientist by counting birds from the comfort of your own home. Attend FOWALS meeting on February 6th at the Dockside at 11:30 to learn why it is important and how to count and record your sightings. It's a great way to enjoy winter and contribute to the information that scientists use to track the health and migration of our bird populations.

Also, the end of February is the time to go to The Nature Habitat on a skunk cabbage foray. Skunk cabbage is the first woodland plant to bloom after winter dormancy. Follow the trail to the bottom of the ravine. Take the left fork and follow it to the sign of the Slippery Elm. Look down into the swampy bottom and locate the three skunk cabbage plants in the muck. March isn't too late for a skunk cabbage foray either.

April and May are wonderful months for spring wildflowers at The Nature Habitat. Our Spring Wildflower Walk will be April 14 from 2:00 to 4:00. Join us for a guided tour.

May 4th is a First Saturday at UTOPIA Wildlife Rehabilitators. All staff, volunteers and interns will be giving tours, presenting wildlife inhabitants and educating visitors from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. Friends of Wildlife will be taking a road trip leaving from the parking lot at 11:00. Everyone is welcome to join us!

Winter Bird Feeding

There are easy, fun projects to create treats to help our feathered friends survive harsh weather. Peanut butter pine cones will attract woodpeckers, chickadees, nuthatches, titmice and many others. Just tie a string around the top of a pine cone, slather it generously with peanut butter and roll it in your choice of wild bird seed. Hang it from a tree or hook and watch them come! No pine cones? A toilet paper roll will do as well. Loop a length of yarn through the tube and tie it in a knot. Slather it with peanut butter, roll it in birdseed and hang it outside. Birds love garlands threaded with unsalted peanuts in the shell, raisins, popcorn, cheerios, cranberries or small pine

cones. Decorate a tree with your creations or put your Christmas tree outside as a feeder. The tree also provides shelter and protection from predatory birds. Happy New Year Birding!

Looking forward to Spring

Your Backyard Guide: Helping Amphibians and Reptiles*

Amphibians and reptiles are important parts of the ecosystem too. They eat a large number of mosquitoes, other insects and rodent pests, and can be a valuable food source for other wildlife. Like birds and mammals, amphibians and reptiles are vertebrates, meaning they have a backbone. Unlike birds and mammals, their body temperatures can vary greatly based on their surroundings.

Amphibians include frogs, toads, newts and salamanders. Many live on both land and water. Most adult amphibians have lungs but they also breathe through their skin so they must stay moist to allow oxygen to pass through.

Reptiles include turtles, lizards and (eeek!) snakes. While most reptiles are terrestrial and have dry, scaly skin, some also spend a great deal of time in the water. Reptiles breathe only through their lungs so the swimmers must come up for air.

Here are a few tips to help you improve your backyard habitat for amphibians and reptiles:

They need to be able to reproduce to assure their survival so don't keep them as pets. They are at home where you find them and may try to return if moved to a "better place" such as a park or a woods so leave them be. Amphibians breathe through their skin so they are particularly vulnerable to pesticides. Minimize their use or don't use them at all. Minimize fertilizers that run off into nearby water bodies which is harmful to aquatic animals. Enhance your habitat by landscaping with a variety of native shrubs and trees. Let leaves lie where they fall on all or part of your property and provide logs, rocks, and brush piles as shelter. Ponds can be important breeding habitat for frogs and salamanders but only if they are free of large fish.

President Lecher called for a review of the minutes of the November 14, 2018 meeting. The minutes were approved on a motion by Carol Goodwin, seconded by Shannon Gibbs. Motion carried

Stephanie Peetz gave a brief review of the Treasurer's report. The Treasurer's report was approved subject to audit.

MEMBER INTRODUCTIONS AND COMMENTS

Members were asked to introduce themselves and were given the opportunity to express comments.

- A member wanted to follow up in regards to the drainage issues he brought up at the November meeting.
 - o Brittany Green and President Lecher both responded that we have been working on the budget for 2019 and will be addressing some of the drainage issues in the new year. We continue to evaluate the roads and drainage issues each time it rains. We do have some areas where water is running down portions of the roadways along with

washing away areas at the roads edge. Brittany has been keeping a list of concerned areas so it can be prioritized once the funds are available in the new budget.

- A member in the audience wanted to thank the board and all of the employees for all of their hard work this year.
- Mike Cutrufelli stated that the CERT Team would be holding their Christmas Party on December 19th at 6:30 at the EOC building (on Ireland St). They continue to look for new members.
- Rick Crawford (Security Chief) spoke briefly in regards to the Lake Santee Grinch who has been taking Christmas decorations from homes/property. It appears it is happening around midnight to 1 AM and from the cameras he believes it is a dark 4 door pick up. As a reminder if you see any suspicious activity please call security or the Sherriff's Department (if warranted).

CORRESPONDENCE

Brittany stated she received a thank you note from Susan Burkhart with the Hospital Foundation thanking the lake for the use of our roads during the Dam Race on Thanksgiving morning. She stated there was a 150 walkers/joggers/runners who participated.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Rules & Regulations - Carol Goodwin

Carol read the following rule:

Rule 1.13 In accordance with Article VII, Section 4 of the Amended By-laws, a member who rents or leases a home in the Subdivision to a non-member of the Association will be subject to a semi-annual rental fee as determined by the Board of Directors.

Carol requested a motion be made to update the fee schedule on rentals from the current fee of \$150 to \$200. Bill seconded the motion, motion carried. A member in the audience asked when the last time this fee had been increased. The board along with the audience discussed and the consensus was it had not been increased in 15+ years.

Carol then presented the second and third readings of rules 2.2 and 2.9 and read each rule in its entirety. Carol Goodwin approved the second reading of rule 2.2 on a motion and seconded by Bill Ryle, motion carried. With no changes being requested Carol Goodwin then asked for a motion to waive the third reading and move forward with the rule change. Randy Ostendorf made a motion to second the rule change as presented, motion carried.

Carol Goodwin approved the second reading of rule 2.9 on a motion and seconded by Bill Ryle, motion carried. Again with no changes being requested on the rule Carol asked for a motion to waive the third reading and move forward with the rule change. Randy Ostendorf made a motion to second the rule change as presented, motion carried. Below are the proposed rule changes with the change in red.

Rule 2.2 In accordance with the laws of the State of Indiana, all persons shall hold a valid driver's license before being permitted to operate a motor vehicle on the roadways within the subdivision including motorized carts as defined in rule 2.9. All motorized vehicles operated on the roadways must meet the licensing requirements, including proof of financial responsibility or liability insurance,

as required by the State of Indiana for operation on public highways. An exception to the above requirement will allow persons 12 years of age and older to operate a motorbike limited to 50cc's during daylight hours only.

Rule 2.9 Motorized Carts

- (a) As used in this rule "motorized cart" means any conveyance that is motor driven by gas or electricity, and is used to carry passengers or cargo, and that is smaller than normal road type vehicles such as cars or trucks. Motorized carts may be characterized as golf carts or utility carts. Operators of motorized carts must hold a valid driver's license or valid learners permit and accompanied by a licensed driver 18 years of age or older.
- (b) All users of motorized carts shall make application for the use of such vehicles within the subdivision. Application for motorized carts may be made through the Lake Santee Office. A security officer or Lake Manager must inspect motorized carts to determine the validity of such application and either approve or disapprove the application. The type of permit issued will determine the usage restriction placed on the motorized cart, day only or day/night. Changing permit type after initial issue will require a new application and re-inspection. The permits will be placed on each side of the vehicle. The board of directors shall determine from time to time the amount of fee to be charged for such permits.
- (c) All carts must display 3" lot numbers, of a contrasting color, in the center of each side of the cart, and must have a flag at least 6 feet above the road surface.
- (d) All motorized carts shall have a rear facing mirror.
- (e) All passengers should be properly seated and the number of passengers should not exceed the number of seats available.
- (f) Motorized carts operated after dark will be inspected annually and must be equipped with the following functional safety devices: <u>properly installed</u> white headlights, <u>properly installed</u> red taillights, reflectors on each side, turn signals, brake lights, and amber <u>or white flashing cautionary</u> light. The front, rear and <u>cautionary</u> lights must be visible under normal conditions for a minimum of 500 feet.
- (g) All gas/diesel motorized carts are required to have a non-modified factory exhaust system. This rule does apply to all motorized carts and utility carts within the subdivision including those permitted on county roads via DNR registration.

Carol then presented the first reading for a rule change on 13.17.

Rule 13.17 - Placing of Christmas trees, tire, or other material in Lake Santee <u>without authorization</u> from Lake Management is prohibited. Authorized structures and locations of the structures will be approved by the Lake Manager.

A motion was made by Randy Ostendorf to accept the proposed rule change as read by Carol Goodwin with Bill Ryle providing a second, motion carried. The second reading will take place at the January meeting. There was then some discussion with the audience and other board members. It was stated the structures would be placed in none boating areas and when possible under association owned docks. This will help the smaller bass stay alive as we've had some issues with growing the bass population in the lake. This winter the maintenance team will work to build a few possible structures to be placed in the lake as recommended by Aquatic Control.

Shannon stated the judging for the Holiday Lighting contest was completed on Saturday, December 8th. The results with photos have been placed on the Lake Santee website with a link from the Facebook page. Breakfast with Santa will take place this Saturday, December 15th starting at 9am with Santa arriving at 10AM.

Shannon added she is currently working on the 2019 recreation calendar. She has received schedules from the Bass Club and the Lake Santee Women's Club. She presented the Bass Club schedule as provided by Chip Ayers and requested approval for 6 events in 2019. A motion was made by Carol Goodwin to accept the Bass Club schedule as presented with Randy Ostendorf providing a second, motion carried.

Lakes & Beaches - Randy Ostendorf

Randy stated we received the fish survey and the results of our DNR Dam Inspection. The fish survey results were similar to that of years past. We continue to have issues with our bass population sustaining itself, which calls for continued stocking. We have healthy adults, but the fry (young large mouths under 2 inches) are lacking safe places to go after hatching to avoid predators. In order to help our bass sustain themselves and grow our fishery, it is of high priority to begin placing artificial structures and natural vegetation in the lake.

Lake management and board members are working to create approved structures that can be placed in the lake at approved locations. We would like to pursue this initiative for the next 3 years and hope to see the results in the next fish survey. Carol Goodwin previously read the first reading of an amendment to rule 13.17 this evening with the first reading passing. The second reading will take place at the January meeting.

Randy stated we did see a decrease in Gizzard shad in this survey. This is likely the result of the harsh winter last year. We are continuing our efforts to naturally combat the shad by lowering the lake. This condenses the fish into a small area allowing the predator fish to feed on the shad. It also helps because the shad are very sensitive to weather change. They have to constantly move in order to stay warm. If we make their area small, they will die off from the cold. If you see lots of dead fish on the shorelines, do not panic as this means the plan is working.

The dam inspection by DNR resulted in the recommendation of a visual inspection to our spillway by a structural engineer before Spring 2019. As many of you know our spillway has had some work done in the past and we do monitoring to review any shifts in the surface. In recent discussions about Dam inspections we have been researching inspection methods more comprehensive than visual ones. After further discussion with DNR we decided to move forward with ground penetrating radar (GPR) to gain additional insight into potential voids or issues beneath the surface.

Randy asked for a motion that we approve the spending of up to \$5,060 for a GPR inspection. Carol Goodwin made a motion and seconded by Bill Ryle, motion carried. It was noted that we received three quotes and have selected the middle quote but will do a little more research before scheduling the inspection. At this point Blood Hound is who we believe will complete the GPR inspection.

Clean Up – Steve Gauck

Brittany stated in Steve's absence that one fine has now stopped and a fine on a different property has started. They are working to get out thank you letters. She also added that they are being a little lenient on brush piles as she knows there was a lot of trees/limbs down and want to give plenty of time for clean up to be completed.

Roads & Maintenance - Polly Ann Fox

Brittany gave the roads & maintenance report in Polly's absence. She stated that we continue to battle the potholes on all the gravel and milling roads. It is an everyday task for maintenance but they try their best in getting them filled quickly. The milling roads cause the largest issue right now and require about a load a month to fill. She stated that their goal is to keep the roads clear and safe every day. The winter plan is to be out very early on bad weather days to begin plowing and treating the roads. The maintenance crew started working umbrella project (undersides) this week. It is a slow progress but we hope to have it completed by springtime. The ice storm a few weeks ago took down a lot of trees/limbs and maintenance worked quickly to get it cleaned up.

Security – Bill Ryle

Bill stated that we have seen a recent increase in thefts and vandalism. We are using the new security cameras to the best of our abilities to try and catch the individuals causing the issues. He added there has been an increase in individuals cutting through driveways that connect the lake with county roads. This is against the rules and these driveways should have a rope or something across the driveway when not in use. There are also tracks and ruts where people are cutting through lots to enter the lake and avoid the gates. Fencing will be placed along this area soon.

OLD BUSINESS

Purchase of Lot 64

President Lecher wanted to update the audience on the purchase of lot 64. He stated the POA closed on the property earlier in the day. The lot was attractive for the association to own as it holds the commercial rights for the subdivision when it was originally platted.

NEW BUSINESS

Performance bonuses

President Lecher stated during the executive meetings for the upcoming budget it was determined the board would like to provide some bonuses for performance where warranted. Carol made a motion to approve bonuses as discussed during the prior budget session. Bill Ryle provided a second, motion carried.

Payroll provider

Brittany presented to the board a quote for a new payroll provider as we've had a lot of issues recently with our current provider. The quote is for \$95 per pay period with the quoted amount being for one year with the rate being the same no matter how many direct deposits are being made (this will be nice during summer months when we have extra staff). The provider would switch from Paycor to Solutions Booking & Payroll, which is a local vendor. The change would take place at the first of the year. Paycor was very costly with a recent 7% increase along with being non-responsive to our needs. Carol made a motion to switch payroll providers starting the first of the year and was seconded by Bill Ryle, motion carried.

Restaurant lease

President Lecher stated he had presented a lease to the board during executive session for a renewal of the current lease with Stacy Beaver. He stated it is essentially the same lease, however, the one major change is the association will take over the trash service by adding that as a stop to our current contract with Best Way. The trash will be picked up bi-weekly, which will help reduce the odor that is noticed during the summer months. Brittany also added that maintenance has added a small-wired bin for cardboard to be placed in. A motion was made by Carol Goodwin to accept the lease as presented to the board in the executive session with a second provided by Shannon Gibbs, motion carried. The board was also presented with a request to provide a \$100 refund to the restaurant due to the smell caused when the floors in the outside bathrooms were finished. It was stated there was a loss of business that afternoon/evening due to the strong fumes it created. The board agreed to a \$100 refund with Carol Goodwin making the motion and Randy Ostendorf providing the second, motion carried.


MANAGER'S REPORT
