Disrupting the Drainage

Here are some tips to help keep the water from pooling in your ditch or your neighbors ditch this spring.

- Clear the path! Make sure leaves, sticks, rocks, and plants are out of the way.
- Do not plant shrubs or grasses in the ditch or blocking your culvert.
- Check your culvert for blocks or breaks. If water pools behind it, then your culvert is the issue. You must fix them.
- If you filled in our ditch, you are responsible for the entire culvert.
 You must keep it clear and keep water off the road.

He said he would talk to them and he would try to go help them out.

This mindset impacted me greatly. What if we all just helped one another? What if instead of criticizing the properties, we tried to help the neighbor?

It is this behavior of Du that made me change my approach. And through that, I am asking for your support.

Some plants can cause more damage. Honeysuckle, for example, is an invasive and damaging plant. They cause great amounts of erosion and often have to be removed by professionals.

Another thing to consider is if it is invasive. This means it may spread quickly. Some invasive species can overtake the area and be hard to control (like Cattails). If you are not sure, ask me in the office. I will help you find the plants that will work.

We will begin doing our spring cleaning in April



It's all about The Birds and The Bees!

How to attract birds – Providing a variety of habitat will attract many species of birds to your backyard and the Lake Santee area. About 30 species in each region of the country will nest in boxes built to individual specifications and mounted properly*. Others require natural habitat such as the ground, dense undergrowth, tall trees, dead trees, tree branches, marshes, wetlands and meadows. These nesting sites are available at Lake Santee. Can you match the bird to its nesting site?

- 1) Ground
- 2) Dense undergrowth
- 3) Tree cavities
- 4) Tree branches
- 5) Nesting boxes
- 6) Canopy of woods and forests, platforms
- 7) Tall grasses, meadows, marshes
- 8) Under eaves, gutters other structures
- 9) Vines on buildings, ledges, planters

- a) Robin, Barn Swallow
- b) Eagle, Great Blue Heron, Osprey
- c) Woodpecker, Owl
- d) Redwing Blackbird
- e) Hummingbird, Oriole, Grosbeak, BlueJay
- f) Bluebird, Purple Martin, Chickadee, Wren
- g) American Goldfinch, Mourning Dove
- h) Cardinal
- i) Killdeer*

Remember, all birds need food, water, shelter and perching sites.

How to rescue a bird – While the leading cause of bird deaths is feral and domestic cats, collision with buildings and vehicles comes in second. There are things that can be done about controlling predatory cats and adding reflective remedies to windows.* But for backyard birders the question becomes what to do for the stunned bird (frequently a favorite one, it seems) after hearing the thud on the window and looking out to see it on the ground. First, get a cardboard box (with air holes) and line it with a towel or T shirt so that she won't slide around.* Gently cover and catch the bird with a towel or net and place her in the box. Don't touch the bird. Close the box securely. Keep her in a quiet, warm, dark place, away from activity. Check her every 30 minutes to see if she has revived and can be released. If she hasn't recovered in 2 hours, seek help from a rehabilitator. Deb Evans (812-593-2996), Betty Gabbard (812-663-9478) and Charm Seright (812-663-5465) are registered with Kathy Hershey at UTOPIA Wildlife Rehabilitators to transport injured wildlife and may be able to help you. Kathy (812-546-63180 is licensed to treat songbirds and raptors as well as mammals and reptiles.

How Birds count at Lake Santee – The results of the Great Backyard Bird Count are in. Thanks to Deb Evans for tallying and counting, Carol and Bob Reger, Mary Tapke, Betty Gabbard, and Kim Belter for counting.

Bees and other Pollinators

are essential to the plants that feed birds and humans. Some native bee-friendly plants for your garden are asters, black-eyed Susan, blazing star, goldenrod, Joe Pye weed, purple coneflower, monarda, sunflower, ironweed, butterfly weed and mint. Watch the Monarch/Butterfly/Pollinator Garden at the recycle center for spring blooms.

- A member asked about how to go about having a rule reviewed.
 - It was suggested that he get with Carol Goodwin after the meeting to discuss.
- A member thanked President Lecher for all of his hard work along with the rest of the Board.
- Charm Seright spoke on behalf of Friends of Wildlife. She stated they would have their annual walk on April 14th from 2-4PM. They will have a knowledgeable guide for the walk along with light refreshments afterwards. Everyone is welcome to attend.
- Mike Cutrufelli reminded everyone in the audience that the CERT meeting is held on the 3rd Wednesday of the month and they are always looking for more volunteers.
- Paul Gosnell (Lake Santee RWWD President) asked for a few minutes to speak
 on behalf of the District. He stated in December two of their board members
 retired, Scott Gibbs & Clair Fredrickson. Scott was not in attendance but he
 wanted to recognize both for their service to the lake. He stated Clair joined the
 District Board in 2002 and helped them get through many obstacles including the
 new water plant. Paul presented Clair with a plaque to thank him for his service.

CORRESPONDENCE

Brittany stated she had three pieces of correspondence to present.

- 1. A letter was received from American Electric Power that they would be performing right-of-way vegetation maintenance.
- 2. The Lake Office was notified of a foreclosure for a property located in the subdivision.
- 3. A request was received in the office to add a beehive to the butterfly pollinator habitat located near the recycle center.
 - President Lecher responded that he would like to discuss this with Steve Gauck for additional feedback, as he was heavily involved in helping this be established.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Rules & Regulations – Carol Goodwin

Carol stated the Rules & Regulations committee has been going through the current rules to update the rules to reflect what is currently practiced.

Carol then presented the first reading of the following rules.

Swimming

- 6.1 Swimming shall be at each person's own risk. No lifeguard is on duty at the main beach or east beach. If lifeguards are on duty they will patrol the main beach only. No lifeguard will be on duty at the east beach.
- 6.2 When a lifeguard is on duty he or she will conduct safety checks lasting no longer than ten minutes every house as necessary. During this break all swimmers will leave the water.

Fishing

7.8 – The following baits are prohibited: gold fish minnows, red hoarse suckers, or carp minnows, bullhead catfish minnows, or gizzard shad minnows.

Property

11.3 - Motor homes, defined as a self-propelled camper with sanitary facilities designed and manufactured for such use, are permitted in the subdivision for use as temporary camping facilities. Motor homes are not to be used as permanent living quarters. Motor homes on vacant lots must be in use every night or removed from the subdivision. No motor home shall be in the subdivision for more than 14 consecutive days. A five-day interval shall be required between stays. No motor home shall be in use for a total of more than 28 days per year. Motor homes may not be parked on Association access areas or parking lots at night. All motor homes must have current license and registration. Motor homes may be stored within the subdivision if stored in a garage out of sight at all times. Any such garage must meet all building rules and regulations. Motor homes will not be permitted to be stored within the subdivision.

Buildings

Rule 12.4 – Shoreline protection can be wood, concrete, stone, riprap, plastic piling or masonry. Demolition and all other materials must have the approval of the building committee.

This rule is under consideration for making all shoreline property owners be responsible for protecting the shoreline with an approved building material such as riprap.

Recreation – Shannon Gibbs

Shannon presented upcoming activities to the Board for approval.

The Easter Egg hunt will take place on April 20th. Donations are currently being accepted in the office. The "filling of the eggs" will be on Friday April 19th in the Community Room.
