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


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
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Make sure your home is safe from outside fires. Don't Let Your World Go Up in Smoke. Fire is Everyone Fight.

Home fire safety doesn't stop at the door. There are many fire risks outside the home. You may have these in your backyard. Here are some ways you can keep your home safer from outside fire.

Grilling

Make safe outdoor cooking a priority.

- Move the grill away from siding, decking, and other things that can catch fire.
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill when it's hot.
- Keep your grill clean so leftover grease and fat won't catch on fire.



Summer months mean grilling! Make sure your home is protected.

Keep grills 3 feet away from your house and anything that can burn.



Warning: Fireworks are dangerous to people and pets. Using them puts your property at risk.

The best way to stay safe from fireworks is to not use them. Instead, attend a public fireworks display put on by professionals.

Backyard Fire Pits

Permanent and portable fire pits bring fire danger to your home. You can prevent fire or burn injury with these simple steps:

- ☐ Make sure the fire pit is at least three feet away from your house and anything that can burn.
- ☐ Closely watch children when the fire pit is in use.
- ☐ Use a metal screen over wood-burning fires to keep sparks from floating out.
- ☐ Turn off or put out fires before you leave the backyard.
- Store matches and lighters out of children's sight and reach.

Tips for Boaters

Here are some simple recommendations for all boaters to help protect the water, the shore, and our fun!

- When using wake enhancing equipment please stay in 10 feet of water. This will help keep sediment from suspending and also keep your wake large!
- When listening to music, keep the levels reasonable and the music appropriate for all listeners.
- Stay away from shorelines. Even when running at idol, you may be too close to a dock with swimmers or a fisher.
- Be cautious of where you cast when fishing, while the best spots are near structures, docks also are home to expensive boats that don't want scratched.
- Respect others. Do not behave in a way that will limit someone else's enjoyment of the lake.

Impacts of Fertilizers on Our Water Quality

How fertilizing your lawn may be harming your water

Spring is a time of growth and beauty and in a community like ours, a well-manicured lawn and a freshly planted field are just the way of life. We often add nitrogen and phosphorus fertilizers in order to enhance the growth in our lawns and help crops get the nutrients they need. But, what happens to the phosphorus and nitrogen in the fertilizer that are not absorbed by your lawn or crops? Those growth enhancing nutrients are often washed down into our water.

The impact of this Nitrogen and Phosphorus runoff can be detrimental to our water quality. They begin a process called eutrophication. The fertilizers from your lawn will begin to feed the algae in the water, resulting in explosive algae blooms. These explosive blooms are best known as Red or Blue tide. When the algae blooms, it requires oxygen. As it begins to use more oxygen, the water will become oxygen deprived and the life in the lake will compete for that oxygen. The algae blooms suspend in the water and on top of the water preventing the sunlight from reaching other plants. After being deprived of sunlight, the plants die and join the leaves and debris on the lake bottom in decomposition. Decomposition also takes oxygen from the water, further depleting the resource.

Once the eutrophication process has begun, it is a cycle that is costly to interrupt. Aquatic Control has assisted us for many years on breaking the cycle by treating the lake for algae multiple times per summer.

The chemicals used by Aquatic Control are not harmful to people, fish, or plants. They focus strictly on the algae blooms. But, like most things in life, it costs us more to fix an issue once it has begun than it would to prevent the issue.

If as a community we all took ownership and responsibility for how our behavior impacts the lake, we could make a big difference. Here are some tips of things you can do today that will impact our water quality for years to come.

- 1. Use Phosphorus Free fertilizers on your lawn and landscaping.
- Pay attention to the weather when you fertilize. If it rains soon after, you will have wasted the fertilizer on your lawn and instead fertilize the lake.
- 3. **Do not overwater your lawn.**Conservative watering leads to less water consumption and less harmful nutrients entering the lake.
- 4. **Grow plants or trees along your shoreline.** These will protect the shore and help create a barrier for those nutrients to enter the water.
- 5. Research before you apply. It only takes a few minutes to google, but it could save our lake!

Lake Update>>>

Eutrophication in Pictures

Step One

Nitrogen and Phosphorus fertilizers are used on fields and lawns.



Step Three

The algae and plants in the lake begin to absorb the phosphorus and nitrogen. Algae blooms explode in the water.



Step Four

Algae blooms use oxygen in the water to bloom and create a blanket by suspending on top and within the lake. This gives our water a murky or unclear look.



Step Five

Plants within the water cannot get sunlight because of blanket of algae. Dead plants and leaves on the lake bottom begin to decompose, further depriving the lake of oxygen.




Rain and excessive watering washes the unabsorbed nutrients (phosphorous and nitrogen) into the lake.



Step Six

The fish within the waterbody begin to die and the lake becomes an ecosystem where no life is possible.




Learning to Love Nature

- 2. **Most snakes are harmless!!** While some snakes are venomous, most (if not all) in our area of Indiana are non-venomous. This means they won't hurt you. However, you should always use caution with snakes and NEVER pick one up unless someone educated on them is helping you.
- 3. **Snakes SMELL using their TONGUES!** So next time a snake sticks its tongue out, he isn't being rude, he is just taking in the smell of the world around him!

MEMBER INTRODUCTIONS AND COMMENTS

Members were asked to introduce themselves and were given the opportunity to express comments.

- A member stated he did not feel like enough of the member comments/discussions during the meeting were being included in the monthly minutes.
- A member stated that she believes there are not enough members on the Rules & Regulations committee that is currently going through the By-Laws and Rules for review. The member believes the committee should be more diverse.
 - Carol Goodwin responded that there are actually two separate committees; committee one consists of three board members Carol Goodwin, Doug Lecher, and Stephanie Peetz; committee two consists of Carol Goodwin, Dick Veach, and Gina Julien. The volunteer committee makes recommendations to the board committee on what should be brought to the full attention of the board for discussion and recommendations.
 - Carol then stated that any rule change has three readings before it is complete. The readings are published in the meeting minutes through the Smoke Signals.
 - Carol then asked if anyone has a recommendation on rules they would like to see addressed to please submit in writing via email to Carol and she will present the ideas to the committees. The current focus is to bring existing rules up to date.
- Rick Crawford (Security Chief) addressed the audience in stating we did have one Security Guard resign and Jim Hornig has returned to assist.
- A member brought up speeding issues on the east side of the lake.
 - Rick Crawford responded if you see someone speeding please call Security and try to provide information on the vehicle. They do their best to catch speeders to keep the roads safe for everyone.
- Mike Cutrufelli reminded everyone in the audience that the CERT meeting is held on the 3rd Wednesday of the month and they are always looking for more volunteers. Please contact Mike for additional details.
- A member asked what type of communication the board has with our county commissioners and/or county council. He also stated the changes at the airport would have an impact on the entire county.
 - President Lecher responded that in the past we haven't had a lot of luck but can try to figure out a better approach with the county.
- Paul Gosnell stated that Nancy Fredrickson recently held a meet & greet in the community room for one of the mayoral candidates for the City of Greensburg.

CORRESPONDENCE

Brittany stated she has received numerous emails in regards to tents, the rules and possible changes, as well as whom to contact.

At the prior meeting a member asked about placing a few beehives at the butterfly pollinator habitat located near the recycle center. President Lecher responded that although the agreement for the butterfly pollinator habitat does allow this. The board discussed in detail and determined it best to decline the request

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Rules & Regulations - Carol Goodwin

Carol started her report by doing the 2nd reading of the following rules:

Swimming

- 6.1 Swimming shall be at each person's own risk. No lifeguard is on duty at the main beach or east beach. If lifeguards are on duty they will patrol the main beach only. No lifeguard will be on duty at the east beach.
- 6.2 When a lifeguard is on duty he or she will conduct safety checks lasting no longer than ten minutes every house as necessary. During this break all swimmers will leave the water.

Fishing

7.8 – The following baits are prohibited: gold fish minnows, red hoarse suckers, or carp minnows, bullhead catfish minnows, or gizzard shad minnows.

Property

11.3 - Motor homes, defined as a self-propelled camper with sanitary facilities designed and manufactured for such use, are permitted in the subdivision for use as temporary camping facilities. Motor homes are not to be used as permanent living quarters. Motor homes on vacant lots must be in use every night or removed from the subdivision. No motor home shall be in the subdivision for more than 14 consecutive days. A five-day interval shall be required between stays. No motor home shall be in use for a total of more than 28 days per year. Motor homes may not be parked on Association access areas or parking lots at night. All motor homes must have current license and registration. Motor homes may be stored within the subdivision if stored in a garage out of sight at all times. Any such garage must meet all building rules and regulations. Motor homes will not be permitted to be stored within the subdivision.

After reading the rules Carol then asked for a motion to amend rule 6.1, 7.8, 11.3 as read and strike rule 6.2. Shannon Gibbs seconded the motion, motion carried.

At the last meeting Carol asked for feedback on rule 12.4 as her committee was thinking of a possible change for this rule. She stated she did receive feedback and a formal rule change will be developed and brought up at a future meeting.

Carol then addressed the request to allow tents. She stated that tents are a part of the Land Restrictions not just the rules/regulations of the subdivision. She stated that American Realty put the land restrictions in place when the subdivision was developed. The Association assumed responsibility of these restrictions when the first board of directors took over. The restriction for tents was placed in the land restrictions, as the developers did not wish for the lake to become a campground. They felt that it would negatively affect the property values as they wished to see Lake Santee develop into a subdivision with homes and not just have individuals purchase a lot for lake rights and to camp. A member in the audience did state in the early years of Lake Santee they would camp at Moccasin Meadows.

Carol stated the board of directors couldn't easily change the land restrictions. Carol added that any attempt to change the Land Restrictions would be very costly to the membership as an attorney would need to be involved with any attempted change as well as a mailing to notify the membership of an effort to change the Land Restrictions. It would take 2/3 of all lot owners to respond in the affirmative for a change to take place. If a 2/3 votes in the affirmative was not received the cost associated with this would be for nothing. It was stated that when the By-Laws were last changed that it was very difficult to obtain the required votes and that we also don't have a great turnout of the membership to even vote in the yearly election.

A few members in the audience asked about the possibility of allowing tents just on holiday weekends. Carol responded that if we don't enforce the land restrictions it in turn could make the land restrictions and rules & regulations invalid. This could result in lawsuits being filed against the Association. Which again, could result in a costly issue for the membership.

Recreation – Shannon Gibbs

Shannon stated that at the previous board meeting we approved a liability waiver for special events. The board would like to allow Brittany to be able to sign acceptance of the waivers when they come into the office for special events. Shannon then proceeded to read a resolution to allow this. It was noted that we should remove Brittany's name from the resolution and just state Lake Manager. Shannon asked for a motion to accept the amended resolution, with Carol Goodwin providing a second. Motion carried.

Shannon stated that the Easter Egg Hunt would be on Saturday, April 20th at 11AM. It will last for approximately 3 seconds. At 10AM on April 19th volunteers can help fill the eggs. The office is currently accepting candy or monetary donations.

The summer season will kick off on May 25th with Captain Dan in the amphitheater.

Lakes & Beaches - Randy Ostendorf

Randy stated that we have added six Wood Duck boxes to lake access areas around the lake. With a special thanks to Tony Lake for his craftsmanship. We will again start

stocking fish and are planning the regular recommended stocking. If you are interested in building a fish structure for our fish habitat, please go to the office with your plans to discuss.

The Booster Club has offered to purchase playground equipment to be placed at both beaches along with some pieces to be placed in the grass area at the main beach. Polly Ann Fox asked for a motion to accept the gift from the Booster Club pending final size and location to be worked out. Carol Goodwin provided a second, motion carried.

Roads & Maintenance - Polly Ann Fox

Polly stated the maintenance crew completed the following during the month of March:

- Equipment maintenance and prep for summer mowing

Polly added that we are currently looking for summer maintenance help. You must be 16 to apply please see the office for more information or the Lake Santee website.

Polly stated the planned paving was not completed due to the fall weather. O'Mara will honor our prior quote from last year to pave 1.5 miles at \$61,600. Since O'Mara will already be here the board felt it would be worth our while to attempt to get additional paving completed. Our hopes were to pave 2.5 miles, however, this was slightly higher than what we have available in the budget and in the set aside, with the quote for 2.5 miles at \$102,667.

Between the money that is currently budgeted for paving along with the funds in the set aside we could pave 2.375 miles for \$97,533.40, this includes the 1.5 miles we already committed to. The areas being paved will not be continuous as we have multiple areas in need of attention. Polly asked for a motion to spend \$97,533.40 to pave 2.375 miles with Shannon Gibbs providing a second, motion carried. O'Mara has been out and marked the road where paving will take place with them providing the calculation on the 2.375 miles.

Polly stated that her and Brittany would be getting together to talk about the different roadways and determine the best course of action as we are having lots of issues with millings. They will look to lay out a plan for the next six years for all of the roads. This will allow us to better budget and create set-asides.

Polly stated the transmission in the Dodge 1500 truck either needs replaced or repaired. We received two quotes from Widener Automotive Inc. in Batesville.

- 1. To replace the transmission \$3,293.72
- 2. To repair the transmission \$2,564.15

In discussion it was determined that the repair could actually be costlier depending on what issues the existing transmission has. It was decided that it would be best to replace the transmission. Randy Ostendorf made a motion to accept the quote for the replacement of the transmission with Steve Gauck providing a second, motion carried.

Security - Bill Ryle

Bill stated as the weather warms up to be cautious on the roadways at all hours. Many people work and exercise at different times. When you are walking in the dark or at dusk please wear reflective clothing or lights. If you notice individuals not following the rules or speeding please call security.

Farmer's Market

At the last meeting Mary Tapke asked the board to consider allowing a Farmer's Market. It was previously stated that we would need additional information before we could consider this request. Mary stated that they were looking to do two markets with one being the end of July and another the first part of August. She is currently looking into vendors and what types of items could be sold. Steve Gauck had previously provided information to Mary on the Greensburg Farmer's market and its requirements. A market master would be needed as well as more direction to be managed by a sub committee. At the time the board does not feel there is sufficient information to make a recommendation on approval. Additional parameters will need to be discussed and set before an approval can be completed; however, the board does like the idea. This request is tabled until further information is provided.

Set Asides

At last months meeting we transferred the set asides from the 2018/2019-budget cycle. The board of directors has determined we would like to move the funds at the start of the budget year (2019/2020). A request was made by President Lecher to move \$92,500 for five set aside accounts from the First Financial account to Edward Jones. Carol Goodwin made a motion and seconded by Angel Hocker, motion carried.

Realtor for listing lake owned lots

MANAGER'S REPORT

Resigned members – 1 Non-members – 13 Triple memberships – 3 Trust non-member – 1 Double memberships – 21 Total members – 743

Out of the total billed for membership there is still \$110,000 in outstanding dues/assessments. This was the first year the billing provided an option to donate additional funds. The association received \$1,786.50 in additional funds.

Brittany stated that she attended the Indiana Lake Managers conference and learned a lot. She will be sharing some of that information in the Lake Life section of the Smoke Signals. This will include erosion control, silt and sedimentation, along with the boating impact on the water.

Heavy Trash will take place from May 4th – 12th during normal recycle center hours.

There will be a community clean up day to assist other members who have difficulties getting yard work completed. This will be May 4th from 9-Noon. If you know of someone in need of assistance please contact Brittany.

There being no further business, Shannon Gibbs moved to adjourn, seconded by Randy Ostendorf, motion carried. The next regular meeting will be held on May 8, 2019 at 7:30 PM in the Community Room.


