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




Parents of young children must stay with their children while in the lake. Parents must sign a release form for participants.

***All items MUST be clean and dry. You can leave lids on bottles.

Recycle these at our local grocery stores instead!

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
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
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


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Make sure your home is safe from outside fires. Don't Let Your World Go Up in Smoke. Fire is Everyone Fight.

Home fire safety doesn't stop at the door. There are many fire risks outside the home. You may have these in your backyard. Here are some ways you can keep your home safer from outside fire.

Grilling

Make safe outdoor cooking a priority.

- Move the grill away from siding, decking, and other things that can catch fire.
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill when it's hot.
- Keep your grill clean so leftover grease and fat won't catch on fire.



Summer months mean grilling! Make sure your home is protected.

Keep grills 3 feet away from your house and anything that can burn.



Warning: Fireworks are dangerous to people and pets. Using them puts your property at risk.

The best way to stay safe from fireworks is to not use them. Instead, attend a public fireworks display put on by professionals.

Backyard Fire Pits

Permanent and portable fire pits bring fire danger to your home. You can prevent fire or burn injury with these simple steps:

- ☐ Make sure the fire pit is at least three feet away from your house and anything that can burn.
- ☐ Closely watch children when the fire pit is in use.
- ☐ Use a metal screen over wood-burning fires to keep sparks from floating out.
- Turn off or put out fires before you leave the backyard.
- Store matches and lighters out of children's sight and reach.

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9-1-1 Address / Location Signs

The Clarksburg Volunteer Fire Department is selling address signs that can be attached to your mailbox or anywhere else to identify your property. These signs can be mounted vertically or horizontally to any post. This will help any agency find your property in case of emergency or delivery of items to your home. Lake Algae Testing and Results

What is this algae treatment doing and is it working?

Anyone who is around the lake during the week in the summer has likely seen the red signs at the gate notifying of treatment, or seen the Aquatic Control boat roaming the water. Most of us know that this means we are treating for algae, but not everyone knows what that treatment does and if it is working.

Aquatic Control is a company we have contracted to do this work for us. Their job is simple (not really, but for this article it will be[©]). They come to our lake, provide treatment that is not harmful to people, animals, or plants, then they leave and come back to make sure it worked.

The key items to remember are "not harmful to people, animals, or plants" and "they come back and make sure it worked." Many of our members do not realize that we target harmful algae only. We are not treating with something that will kill plants. They also provide us with information on what they are finding and how the treatments are working.

Aquatic control checks their work like any good scientist. They go to specific locations around the lake and test the same spots each time they come. This gives them a good measure of how well the treatments are working. It also lets them know what issues we are having.

The treatments Aquatic control does target bad algae and measure the levels of the good algae. On the next page, I will explain this differences in the type of algae and why they are all so important.

Now for the results of our recent testing. On May 21, 2019 they collected samples. This was one week after the second treatment of the lake for the year. These samples showed the highest algae levels of the season, which should be expected since the original samples we taken in April, which is a low algae time since water is cool and fertilizers are scarce. Think of algae like a garden. Your lowest growth is expected early and should rise each month until an eventual die off.

The second finding was that even though the levels were the highest of the year, they were still relatively low in number. The algae type found in the lake is a green planktonic algae. This is a type of algae that is small and a great source of food for zooplankton. (Zooplankton are the food source for many of the small fish in our ecosystem). They also found no harmful algae present, in any samples.

Overall, the lake is healthy, thriving, and off to a great start!

Algae: The Good, the Bad, the Ugly

Since you just finished up the last article (if not, go back and read about our algae testing!) You are now ready to understand the difference between algae and why some of these microscopic plants are GREAT and some are not! Let's dive right in..

The GOOD: Planktonic Green Algae

This type of Algae is my favorite, and should be yours as well. It is one of the smallest (of all the microscopic plants). This algae can give the water a murky or green tone, but that isn't always a bad thing. These little plants capture the nutrients from grow, they produce oxygen for the water and are an excellent food source for Zooplankton. (Learn



The BAD: Blue-Green Algae

Blue Green Algae may sound good for a lake or pond. This but called one and treated like one) produces harmful toxins that kill fish and can make people sick. When these algae bloom they are bright in color (like pea soup), can produce a foul odor, and can sit on





The UGLY: Harmful Algae Blooms (HABs)

HABs occur when the warm water and high levels of fertilizers mix within the water and cause algae to bloom at excessive rates. These blooms aquatic life. They will often result in fish kills. The death of fish then causes further

Learning to Love Nature

Any kid (or most adults) can think of at least one very famous Plankton? Hint, he is a villain always after a sandwich recipe form a sponge under the sea...

But, what if I told you that there are trillions of plankton hanging out right in our very own lake? And even better, they are not villains at all, instead they are our lake's MVC (most valuable creature) that most of us have never seen!

These **mighty miniatures** are called **ZOOPLANKTON** and they are the tiny life of the lake. Without them, we would have no useful aquatic life.





Zooplankton: The Life of the Lake

Zooplankton are microscopic creatures that live in our water. The name zooplankton comes from the Greek words "zoon" meaning "animal" and "planktos" meaning "drifter". This name refers to their inability to swim on their own. They rely on the water to move them causing their movements to be in a jerk-type fashion. No, they are not jerks, they just jump or twitch through the water. As they drift, they graze like a cow in a pasture, eating microscopic plants (the algae in the article above.)


As the main food source for many small fish like bluegill, these creatures are usually transparent (clear or see-through) which helps them to be camouflaged from predators. However, some zooplankton that live in fishless ponds have bright colored bodies in beautiful orange and blues. Some zooplankton actually produce energy through photosynthesis just like a flower or plant! These types will stay close to the top of the water.

Some zooplankton are so small they can't be seen with the naked eye, while others you may be able to see.

This summer, I challenge you to take a clear glass and dip it into the lake. Hold the glass up to the light and see if you can spot any of these magnificent creatures jerking around!

Fun Fact: If Zooplankton had no enimies, they would reproduce enough in half a year to cover the earth's surface 3 feet deep!!! YIKES!!! Thank goodness for bluegill!

- A member in the audience thanked the board for looking at the rules and how they can be improved.
- Rick Crawford (Security Chief) stated that Security is trying to watch the intersections for those who are not stopping. Warnings and tickets are being issued. Make sure you are stopping at the stop signs! He stated that they are currently looking for 2 more part-time security members. See the office for details.

CORRESPONDENCE

Brittany stated that the office has been notified of two new foreclosures and one postponement on a Sherriff sale.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Rules & Regulations – Carol Goodwin

During last months meeting Rule 4.1 was presented as a rule change. After further discussion with the Board it was tabled and will go back to the drawing board for further discussion. At the last meting Carol read amended rule 11.12 for a first reading. There was one change to the rule from last month putting the rule back up for a first reading.

Property - 11.12 No person shall store in open view any motor vehicle, boat or trailer that is incomplete, inoperable or in the case of motor vehicles are not operated on a regular basis. Any vehicle or trailer that has an expired license plate two years or more outdated must be removed from the members property. Any boat that has an expired sticker more than two years old must be removed from the members property.

Carol asked for a motion to approve rule 11.12 as read, Polly Ann Fox provided a second, motion carried. The rule will be presented for a second reading at the July 10th meeting. Carol then presented rule 11.15 for a second reading.

Property - 11.15 Any lawn mower or other outdoor equipment that is inoperable for more than three months must be stored inside an approved structure or removed from the members property. All lawn mowers or other outdoor equipment in working order and kept outdoors must be stored in an orderly manner.

Carol asked for a motion to approve rule 11.15 with a second by Bill Ryle, motion carried. Carol then asked for acceptance of the 3rd reading with Polly Fox seconding, motion carried. Carol presented to the board a first reading on amended rule 12.3 for consideration.

Building - 12.3 Access to all property shall be by an approved driveway culvert. A building permit is required prior to installation and culvert size will be determined by the building committee to handle water flow requirements. must include a perforated drainage tile with at least a ten (10) inch diameter or larger if the building committee or Lake Manager decides that a larger tile is needed to handle the water flow during excessive rains. Drainage ditches on either side of the driveway must follow the same rule regarding size. Altering a drainage ditch will also require a building permit. The new drainage tile must be able to move surface water from the property and be lower than the road to keep water from entering the road. Any alterations also must not allow water to back up on properties sitting upgrade or beside.

Carol asked for a motion to accept the first reading of rule 12.3 with Polly Ann Fox providing a second, motion carried. The rule will be presented for a second reading at the July 10th meeting. Carol then presented to the board the first reading of a new rule for consideration, rule 12.23.

Building – Rule 12.23 Construction sites must maintain a silt fence to keep dirt from eroding onto the road or other properties and into the lake or other waterways

Carol asked for a motion to accept rule 12.23 as read with Polly Ann Fox providing a second, motion carried. There was some additional discussion with this rule to determine if additional verbiage should be added that the contractor need to review the fence after each rain. It was determined that is in the county requirements and we shouldn't have to address that as well. The

rule will be presented for a second reading at the July 10^{th} meeting. Carol then requested to amend rule 11.13 with a first reading.

Property – Rule 11.13 Open burning of leaves, tree limbs, yard trimmings, and scrap lumber shall be permitted within the subdivision. Burning may occur only when wind and humidity are such that it is safe, and when smoke does not lay close to the ground to cause discomfort to any person in the subdivision. No items shall be burned in any road ditch, in any ditch or ravine that could drain into the lake or other waterways, in the lake bottom when the lake is lowered, or on the road or on Lake Santee Association owned property except by lake personnel in acceptable areas. Campfires are permitted on Lake Santee property in designated areas only (e.g. campfire rings placed on the concrete pads near the amphitheater), with prior approval from the Board of Directors or the Lake Manager. All burn piles must remain at least ten (10) feet from the lake shoreline and should be extinguished prior to sunset. Campfires do not have to be extinguished prior to sunset, provided the fuel is limited to firewood only. Barrels for the purpose of burning or the burning of any other unlisted materials are prohibited.

Carol asked for a motion to approve rule 11.13 as amended with Shannon Gibbs providing a second, motion carried. The rule will be presented for a second reading at the July 10^{th} meeting. Carol then asked to strike the recently amended rule 7.8 and incorporate it with rule 7.11. This was based on the current state rule being brought to Carol's attention. This is the first reading for rule 7.8 and 7.11.

Fishing – Rule 7.8 The following baits are prohibited: gold fish minnows, red hoarse suckers, or earp minnows, bullhead catfish minnows, or gizzard shad minnows.

Fishing – Rule 7.11 Members may use a cast net to collect live Gizzard Shad for use as bait fish. Any live Gizzard Shad collected and not used as bait fish must be killed and not returned to the lake. Cast nets may not be used to eatch sport fish. An individual must not bring to Lake Santee to be used as bait any of the following species: carp, gizzard shad, bull head catfish (all three species), green sunfish, goldfish, suckers, and any other invasive or exotic species. The above mentioned species of fish may be collected by cast net from Lake Santee and used as bait. All unused bait must be killed and properly disposed of, and not returned to the lake alive when finished. Acceptable live bait (minnows) to be brought to the lake are store bought or wild shiners, fathead minnows and creek chubs. However, all live bait used at the lake must not be turned loose alive into the lake when finished.

Carol asked for a motion to strike rule 7.8 and amend rule 7.11 as read with Bill Ryle providing a second, motion carried. The rule will be presented for a second reading at the July 10th meeting.

Shannon stated the Independence Day Celebration would be held on July 6^{th} . The day will be sunny and dry \odot . The following activities are planned:
