BASS TOURNAMENT

The fourth Lake Santee Bass Tournament of the 2019 season was held on July 14th and Mother Nature made sure summer was in full effect for the sixteen teams who took part. The days leading up to the event had been scorchers to say the least. With high temperatures reaching the 90's and water temperatures increasing proportionately, a decision was made to lower the normal five bass tournament limit to three bass for this event. This is an action that has been highly recommended by Aquatic Control and accepted by our anglers as a way to minimize stress under these conditions upon the bass which are caught, held for weigh in, and later released alive back into Lake Santee, thus helping ensure our fishery continues to thrive.

But, please don't think that Lake Santee would disappoint our teams with the lowered limit of fish... The team of Bob Delay and Bill Wettering brought three beautiful bass to the scales totaling 13 lbs. 1.8 oz. to take the day's top award. Their catch included the days big bass, a beautiful 4 lb. 12.4 oz bass! Second place went to the brother team of Leroy and Dan McQueen with three bass weighing 12 lb. 3.8 oz., another great catch!! The father and son team of Matt and Scott Perkins nailed down third place with three bass weighing in at 10 lb 11 oz. Great job to all of our fishermen (and ladies!) on a hot, hot day!

This month's plaques were sponsored by Ronda Peetz with Tree City Properties, Inc. and were donated in memory of Lake Santee's own Jason Ricke. Jason took part in many of our events over the years and is still missed by many...

Until time, remember, please practice CATCH AND RELEASE on all of Lake Santee's bass and take time to take a child fishing!

I hope the past year has been a good one and the coming year is even better. I would like to thank everyone for their continued support and assistance to the fire department. I would also like to thank all the organizations that continue to support the fire department and the community in general. If you would like a fireman to present at your organizations meeting, please let me know when and what subject you would like presented and we will get one of our guys to do the presentation or find someone who can.

We have had our web page and Facebook pages up for some time now and we try to keep them up to date with information that will keep our citizens safe and informed. If there is anything we are not updating that you would like to see on either of them please let us know. Our web page is http://www.clarksburgfiredept.org and you can search in Facebook for Clarksburg Volunteer Fire to see our Facebook page. Please make sure you use the word Volunteer or Clarksburg, West Virginia will show up. Our goal is to keep these pages informative and useful to us all.

Run Report

The department runs did again increase slightly for the past 12 months. We made 181 runs in the past twelve months and the breakdown of the runs includes 74% medical runs, 9% were false alarms and standby runs, the remaining 17% were actual fire runs and car accidents.

Department Report

We continue to work on the department to improve our services and enhance our training abilities. We recently added a special operations trailer that will be used to transport our ice rescue, SCBA fill station and cascade, and our future grain bin rescue equipment. There will be other equipment added as needed to this trailer. We will be putting all this together over the winter. We still need to finish and enhance the two brush trucks and replace the light bars on three of the large trucks with LED lighting that works better and is less stressful on the truck systems. We will be testing our water hauling ability this winter according to the ISO standards. This is the next steps for us to improve our ISO rating yet again. We will be working with ISO to review our rating again this winter, hopefully before the end of the year. We will of course, announce any improvements we make during this review. The goal is to once again save our citizens money on their insurance premiums and improve the safety of our community.

Services Offered

The department continues to offer Knox Box service to anyone purchasing a Knox lock box for their home or business. There are now some cheaper options available at http://www.knoxbox.com for all to review and purchase. Once the box is installed the fire department will have a key to enter the building if needed without causing any damage to the building.

I would like to thank all the firemen and their family for another safe and productive year at the fire department. These people give of their time to attend many meetings, training's and other events as needed. Please take a moment and thank a fireman if you can. The department as always is looking for new recruits to be firemen all the time. If you are interested please contact a fireman or there is an application on our web site as well.

Thank you for your continued support and help over the past year, with your assistance and the hard work of the firefighters we continue to improve our department each year.




ATTENTION ALL LAKE SANTEE RESIDENTS

IDEM was at the LSRWWD plant on 7/15/2019 for an inspection on the plant and water tower. This was a normal inspection which is conducted every 3 years. The inspector noted a few things which are the Emergency Response Sheet needed to be updated, the drain line from the water softener needs an air gap where it connects to the main drain line. They also recommended we look at installing automatic flush valves on some hydrants to help with disinfection by products.

The HAA5 test result was high at Lot 1543 in May. We question the result because the test at lot 1650 was normal and the two tests are normally in the same range. We have retested both locations and are awaiting the new results. We have contacted Dave at Water Solutions Unlimited about his thoughts on the cost and the needed equipment to feed chloraminees at the plant. We are required to contact all customers and make them aware of the test results.

We have stopped all water meter testing and are having the test meter recalibrated. This will take a couple of weeks.

The new LED lighting for inside the plant has been ordered and should be delivered next week.

LEVELS OF HALOACETIC ACIDS ABOVE DRINKING WATER STANDARDS FOR LAKE SANTEE RWWD

Our water system recently violated a drinking water standard. Although this is not an emergency, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened, what you should do, and what we are doing to correct this situation.

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a regular basis. The results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not our drinking water meets EPA's health standards. The results that we received for Haloacetic Acids for the 4/1/2019 to 6/30/2019 monitoring period show that our system currently exceeds the standard(s), or Maximum Contaminant Level(s) (MCL). The MCL for Haloacetic Acids is 60 ug/L. As of 6/30/2019 our locational running annual average for Haloacetic Acids is 68.6 ug/L.

What should I do?

You do not need to use an alternative (e.g., bottled) water supply. However, if you have specific health concerns, consult your doctor.

What does this mean?

Some people who drink trihalomethanes (THM) in excess of the MCL over many years may experience problems with their liver, kidneys, or central nervous system, and may have an increased risk of getting cancer. Some people who drink water containing haloacetic acids (HAA) in excess of the MCL over many years may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

What Happened? What is being done?

We are currently working with IDEM and Water Solutions Unlimited to maximize our treatment process so we can deliver the highest quality water possible. We are installing automatic flush valves on three flush hydrants located at locations where the water main dead ends. This will lower the age of the water and help decrease the haloacetic acids in the water. We also backwashed the granular activated carbon at the water plant to remove any organics, which contribute to the formation of haloacetic acids. We anticipate being back in compliance during the next monitoring period in August 2019.

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

The Nature Habitat

Thanks to all who stopped and visited us at the July Farmer's Market and took a calendar! Several people asked about The Nature Habit location. If you haven't been there, it's on the east side of the lake at 1240 Kiowa Trail Cove. Follow Santee Drive to brown post # 18. Turn on to Kiowa Trail and follow it through the intersection with Mohican and Kutenai. Pass the house on the right and turn up the hill. Turn off the radio and open the windows and enjoy the peace and quiet. In Abba's Butterfly Garden you'll find Monarch butterflies, dozens of caterpillars and perhaps a chrysalis if you look carefully. Commonly seen are Black Swallowtails, Tiger Swallowtails, perhaps a Spicebush Swallowtail or a Zebra Swallowtail. Silver-spotted Skippers and other seasonal butterflies and pollinators vary daily. It started 3 years ago with a couple of raised beds and now it is a Monarch Waystation and pollinator garden. There's a bench so you can sit and watch at your leisure. Take a brochure from the box and walk into the woods for trees and wildflowers. "It is in the still silence of nature where one will find true bliss." (j.j.c)

Butterfly Facts from National Wildlife Federation

MEMBER INTRODUCTIONS AND COMMENTS

Members were asked to introduce themselves and were given the opportunity to express comments.

- A member in the audience asked the two new board members to tell us a little bit about themselves. Andy Laudick and Mike Manlick provided a short introduction once members were finished introducing themselves.
- Paul Gosnell asked if everyone enjoyed the Belairs performance and stated they were looking to invite them back next year for a to be determined date.
- A member in the audience asked about the treasurer's report and it being subject to audit, however, at the annual meeting the CPA that spoke stated they did not

complete an audit but a compiled report. He suggested we think about doing a review with another member stating we ask for some guidance from members in this field.

- Oug Lecher responded that we've looked at doing audits in the past; however, the quotes were usually too expensive but that we could look into doing a review. President Gibbs took down the members name to consult with later as this is his field of profession.
- A member in the audience asked about the possibility of reclaiming a portion of the beach to make it more kid friendly. She stated that where the boats are parking it's packed and showed some concern for safety in the beach area.
- A member in the audience mentioned if safety is a large concern of the membership maybe we need to look at doing additional water patrols and see about finding additional staffing. There are a lot of pros vs. cons but in the end safety always should come first.
- A member in the audience asked follow up questions to last months meeting where there was notification from First Financial Bank about the ATM being removed. He asked if anyone was taking on the task of looking for a new provider. It was also asked if the board would consider adding benches underneath the umbrellas where there is not any.
 - Carol stated she was meeting with First Financial on Friday and would ask about the possibility of a smaller ATM and if not we could contact other financial institutions to see if there is an interest.
 - As far as purchasing additional benches the ones currently at the beach were donated by the Women's Club but Shannon stated that we could consider more at budget time.
- A member in the audience brought up a concern with a temporary shelter located on a waterfront property. It was also brought up that they appear to be leaving fishing lines in the water for a lengthy period of time.
 - A member of the board responded that if you see something out of the ordinary to please call Security at the time of the issue so they can react to it. If it's something you can get a picture of please also feel free to do so and send to Security.
 - Another member mentioned living across the lake from the home in question and that the issues need addressed.
- Another member added additional information in regards to the fishing lines being left in the water along with that it appears someone is doing commercial type fishing from the lake and taking the fish elsewhere. The member mentioned a possible rule violation.
 - Carol stated she has discussed this with the member in question and is working on the issue.
- A concern of boat speed on the water was also brought up.
- A member reminded everyone that boat traffic is to stay 100 feet from the shoreline as boats are coming way to close to the shore and docks.
 - o Another member in the audience agreed with this concern.

- A member in the audience asked that we protect the lake and consider the investments made along with the safety concerns.
- Rick Crawford thanked everyone for his or her comments and stated the issue with the shelter is being addressed. He also thanked the Booster Club for hosting the Belairs.

CORRESPONDENCE

No correspondence was presented to the Board of Directors.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Rules & Regulations - Carol Goodwin

Carol stated that at this time all rule changes are being tabled until the September meeting. This will allow our new board members time to get up to speed and will also allow the Rules & Regulations Committee to meet and review all of the new details that have been provided via email along with those at the Annual Meeting.

Recreation – Andy Laudick

Shannon Gibbs provided the report for the month of July to allow Andy time to get familiar with the Recreation Committee. Shannon stated on August 31 at 7PM the Blue Ridge Banned will be performing in the Amphitheater. She asked if someone would make a motion to added Trent Moss to the Amphitheater calendar for Saturday, September 7, 2019 at 7PM. Andy Laudick made a motion to add Trent Moss for September 7, 2019 with Mike Manklick providing a second, motion carried.

A member in the audience added that the Farmer's Market would take place on August 31st from 9am-12pm.

Lakes & Beaches – Randy Ostendorf

Randy started his report by saying after the comment in regards to leaving a fishing pole in the water for a lengthy period of time he texted a local DNR Conservation Officer and he stated that state statue says the line must be checked every 24 hours. Randy noted that this was private property so our rules may differ. Randy went on to discuss that we have been advised by Aquatic Control to look at stocking fish in the fall instead of the spring. This provides the fish a higher survival rate. They also suggested we stock larger fish then we've previously done. The large mouth bass would range in size from 4 to 6 inches with the hybrid striped bass being 5 to 7 inches. Randy asked for a motion to spend the \$12,000 budgeted for stocking fish with Bill Ryle providing a second, motion carried. Last year we purchased 4,000 large mouth bass and 2,000 hybrid striped bass, the number this year will be slightly less as for the same quantity the quote was over \$14,000. A member in the audience did ask if anyone ever catches the hybrid and someone stated yes. Randy did note that the hybrid striped bass help with reducing the shad population.
